## KIEL, BREMEN ROBOT SITES HIT IN RAIDS

LONDON, Aug. 30 (AP)—Large formations of American bombers battered the continent today, bombing the German ports of Kiel and Bremen and the robot platforms in northern France.

Very heavy forces of British bombers before dawn supported the Russian armies of the north with attacks on the Nazi Baltic ports of Stettin and Konigsberg, and Mosquitos hurled many two-ton blockbusters on battered Berlin and Hamburg.

Weather was bad and bombers cast their explosives by instruments through clouds. A communique said one bomber was lost over the German objective. No mention was made of losses over the German objective.

Up to 500 Flying Fortresses and Liberators with Mustang fighter escorts smashed at the Pas de Calais targets. More than 500 Fortresses and 250 Mustangs went over the German ports.

The flying bomb targets are just in front of advancing allied armies in northern France. More than 1000 heavy bombers participated in the overnight attacks, unloading approximately 1500 tons of high explosives and incendiaries upon Stettin and another great cargo of destruction upon Konigsberg.

This twin blow was in direct support of Russian armies battering at Germany's eastern frontiers, both the Baltic port of Stettin and the east Prussian capital of Konigsberg being important links in German supply lines leading to the Russian front.

An hour after the attack upon Stettin, the air ministry said, reconnaissance revealed smoke from very large fires rising to a great height.

Clouds prevented clear observation of the results at Konigsberg, which was attacked for the second time in four nights.

Both Berlin and Hamburg were hit by speedy Mosquitos, which carry a bomb load of 4000 pounds.

The air ministry said 41 planes were lost in the overnight operations, during which many mines were laid in enemy waters.

Up to 750 heavy U. S. bombers from Italy also struck yesterday in tactical support of Russian armies whipping through Romania by bombing Hungarian rail bridges and yards at Szeged and Szolnok and enemy barracks and trains moving through that threatened Balkan land.

Some of these planes flew into Czechoslovakia and bombed steel works at Moravska Ostrava, the largest plate rolling mill in Europe. The Mediterranean air forces struck transport facilities in northern Italy, Yugoslavia and southern France as well as destroying 12 German planes at the cost of 21.

## Shepherd Faces Murder Charge

THE DALLES, Aug. 30 (AP)—Charles Wilson, 45, Antelope shepherd, faced a first-degree murder charge today in the fatal shooting of his 13-year-old stepdaughter.

The charge was made in an information filed in justice court last night by District Attorney M. W. Wilkinson. Wilson's hearing was postponed to permit him to obtain legal counsel.

The child, Genevieve Fulker, was shot Saturday night as she lay in bed with her mother. Wilson gave himself up near his home yesterday after a two-day manhunt.

## Canarutto Dies From Heart Attack

PORTLAND, Aug. 30 (AP)—A heart attack killed Angelo Canarutto, 35, musical director of the new opera company of New York, while he was motoring near Lake Oswego late yesterday.

Company officials said Bruno Maler, concert master, would conduct the two remaining performances of "The Merry Widow" here.

Canarutto was a former assistant conductor of the Metropolitan Opera association and had conducted the Los Angeles, San Carlo, Cincinnati Summer and Chicago Civic Opera companies.

## YOUNG GIRL SLAIN IN SEATTLE HOME

SEATTLE, Aug. 30 (AP)—Police faced only the thinnest of clues today in the slaying of a Seattle girl, in her home, the second such case here within two months.

Eighteen-year-old Frances Radecep, who graduated from West Seattle high school with scholastic and athletic honors, was found beaten to death in the living room of her home late yesterday. Her mother, Mrs. A. R. Radecep, discovered the tragedy upon her return home at 6 p. m.

The autopsy surgeon said the girl was not raped. He attributed death to a skull fracture and strangulation. Her skull was crushed by a blunt weapon.

Police said the killer apparently escaped after the afternoon slaying without leaving tangible clues. A neighbor said he saw a stranger man approach the porch of the Radecep home in late afternoon, but did not see whether he entered.

The girl was to have left for her first term at Washington State college early next week. Her father is a drug store employee.

## Elections Group Sees Rise in Votes From Service Men
