Church Conference Enters Third Day

FOREST GROVE, Ore., Aug. 30 (AP)—The annual northwest conference of Congregational churches entered its third day today after hearing Dr. Albert Rasmussen urge church members to help war workers adjust themselves in their new communities.

The director of research and survey for the Chicago Congregational union told the 100 delegates that more than 30,000,000 Americans have changed homes in three years.

Dr. Kenneth L. Latourette of Yale university declared that despite the world turmoil Christianity is "more deeply rooted among different peoples than ever before."

Oregon Aids in Navy Enlistments

Oregon is playing an important part in keeping the west ahead of the rest of the nation in the procurement of radio technician candidates for the U. S. navy, announces Recruiter Dan Schreiber of the Klamath Falls navy recruiting station.

A report just received from Washington, D. C., by the recruiter shows that the ninth joint service induction area—which includes Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho, Montana, Arizona, Nevada and Utah—is leading the entire country in actual number of "R.T." recruits despite the fact that some of the other districts have a greater population.

DEWEY SCHEDULES SEVEN MAJOR TALKS

CHICAGO, Aug. 30 (AP)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, republican presidential candidate, will make a 4700-mile, cross-country campaign in September, delivering seven major political speeches, Herbert Brownell Jr., GOP national committee chairman, announced today.

The nominee's nationwide political tour by train will begin on September 7 when Governor Dewey will go to Philadelphia to give the first of his scheduled principal addresses and it will take the New York governor and his party through 21 states en route to and from the Pacific coast. It will conclude with his return to Albany on September 28.

Other cities where Dewey will give chief speeches, each scheduled for 30 minutes and to be broadcast nationally, include Louisville, Seattle, Portland, Ore., San Francisco, Los Angeles and Oklahoma City.

During his cross-country trip, Brownell said, Gov. Dewey will confer with governors of several midwest and far west states, party leaders and industrial, agricultural and other groups during stops in 10 states.

Class Schedules Fixed at KUHS

Final class programs are being arranged at the high school this week, according to Stanley Woodruff, principal.

Workers are now tackling the problem of fitting 1150 students, 48 teachers, and over 200 classes into a workable schedule. Those wishing to make changes in class schedules are asked to report to room 211 at the high school Friday or Saturday morning of this week.

Classes will start on Tuesday morning, September 5.

Pre-registration data indicates that the entering freshman class will be between 375 and 400, which would be the largest in the history of the local high school.

FUTURE VISITS TO SEGREGATED LIMITED

TULELAKE—Future visits to the residence of the Tulelake Japanese segregation center will be limited to emergency situations only, according to a statement released here Monday by WRA officials. The restriction is by order of Dillon Myer, national director of WRA, and was found necessary because of the special situation at Tulelake and the difficult administrative problem created by Japanese outside the segregation camp.

Hereafter, permission to visit the center will be granted only to those persons having an urgent reason for making such a visit. Death or serious illness will be considered sufficient reason for granting visiting permits.

Other reasons for visiting the center will not be recognized except in special cases, it is reported.

TRADES PROGRAM SLATED FOR KUHS

Boys over 16 years of age who have worked during the summer and wish to continue their employment while attending school, may do so by enrolling in the trades and industries program at the high school.

The schedule for this work is to spend one-half day in school, either the morning or afternoon, and to spend the other one-half day on their job. School schedules should be adjusted to conform with this as early as is convenient. Harold Teale will have charge of the program this year, and schedules may be arranged with him in room 203 in the high school. Two credits may be earned toward graduation.

Almost any kind of part-time work will allow a boy to participate in this program. The school program includes related study with the occupation, reference reading, salesmanship, first aid, parliamentary procedure, trade terms, economics, and other subjects.

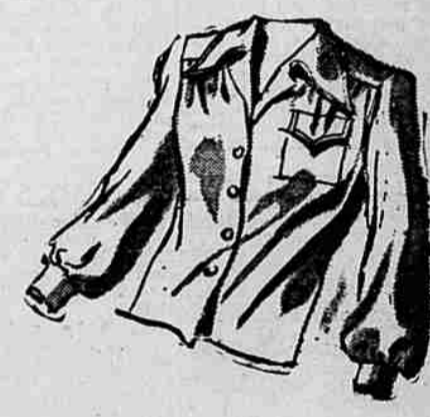
