

POINT VALUES UNCHANGED ON RATIONED MEAT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31 (AP)—Point values of rationed meats will remain unchanged in the four-week period beginning Sunday, September 3, and ending September 30, but some varieties of cheese and canned milk will cost more points.

The point value of group 3 cheese, such as Swiss, Italian, Munster, Limburger, Camembert, Liederkranz, grated, dehydrated, brick, Gouda, Grem, Edam, Bleu and Brie is increased from 8 to 10 points a pound.

Canned milk, both condensed and evaporated, will cost one point a pound, instead of two-thirds of a point. Heretofore, a single can of milk has taken one point, but three cans cost only two points.

In announcing September price point values, the office of price administration said consumers had been buying group 3 cheese in excess of allocation for civilian use, and that sales of canned milk also are running ahead of war food administration allocations.

Creamery butter will continue to cost 16 points a pound, although September charts show a value of 20 points. A "16" will be pasted over this.

The point value of process butter, however, will be increased from 6 to 12 points, to bring its point cost more closely in line with 16 points for creamery butter and 12 points for farm butter.

The OPA said the over-all meat supply for civilians would be 2.1 per cent larger in September than in August, but that the supply of better grades costing points would be 10 per cent smaller.

YANK HAVOCS HIT DIEPPE MUNITIONS

By AUSTIN BEALMEAR LONDON, Aug. 31 (AP)—American Havoc dive-bombers exploded an ammunition dump five miles southeast of Dieppe today in an operation ahead of the fast-moving British and Canadian armies made at the request of Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery.

The dump was in the Darques forest where Havocs bombed a large German oil depot yesterday.

Marauder medium bombers made their second attack in 18 hours on the fortified island of Cezembre, barring access to the mouth of St. Malo harbor.

A strong force of heavy British Halifax bombers returned to the attack on Cezembre island later in the day, letting down through overcast to 2500 feet to beat at the heavy gun batteries.

British Mosquitos struck at enemy war transport and industry in northern France and Germany last night despite the handicap of poor weather.

While the Mosquitos bombed the industrial center of Frankfurt without loss, other squadrons of these speedy all-purpose raiders, operating as fighter bombers, battered rail targets from the fighting front to the German borders.

They plowed through storms and clouds as low as 500 feet and wrecked trains and tracks directly in the path of the retreating Germans.

Strings of rolling stock were left burning in widespread operations extending beyond the Ardennes gap down to Metz and Saarbrücken.

One crew, finding a large concentration of railroad cars in the yards at Sedan, called for help. Soon a whole formation of Mosquitos swarmed over the target, which was left a wreck of burning wreckage.

One train was wrecked at the crossing of the Somme between Amiens and St. Valery by bombing and strafing.

Commission to Take Claims from Vets

SALEM, Aug. 31 (AP)—The state unemployment compensation commission announced today it would begin to take claims September 10 in its 22 offices from returning veterans.

Men and women who have served in the armed forces for 90 days may draw \$20 a week for one year if they can't find suitable work.

HILLMAN DENOUNCED IN ALTERED SPEECH

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 31 (AP)—A speech by republican national headquarters, denouncing Sidney Hillman and the CIO political action committee for backing a fourth term for President Roosevelt, was altered by Gov. Earl Warren before he delivered it over a national radio hookup Tuesday night.

"The New York headquarters sent a draft of a suggested speech to me and it arrived the day before at the capitol in Sacramento," Warren told newsmen. "I worked it over and made such changes as to me seemed desirable. Then it was given to newspapermen."

The governor declared he was unaware why the original speech was released to the press Monday by the republican national committee without his approval. He said the speech was killed Tuesday night by republican headquarters, before publication.

FRESH PEACH JAM IS EASY TO MAKE

Here's a Recipe That Saves Sugar and Fruit

- 4 Cups Ground Peaches
- 6 Cups Sugar
- 1/2 Cup Lemon Juice
- 1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash, peel, and remove pits from 4 pounds fully ripe peaches; grind the fruit. Measure exactly 4 level cups of the ground peaches (add water to fill out last cup, if necessary) in a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin and lemon juice, stir well and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), continue stirring, and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.

CASUALTIES INCREASE AS TEMPO RAISES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31 (AP)—Reaching the period of heaviest fighting in northern France, total army casualties jumped to 284,838 on August 13, an increase of 23,249 over those reported just a week earlier.

Coupled with navy casualties of 58,353, the latest overall figures for the armed services is 343,191, compared with 317,846 a week ago. All figures are on the basis of those officially reported to next of kin and represent a lag of three weeks or more behind action in the field.

Undersecretary of War Patterson who reported the latest army casualty figures to his news conference, said they reflected the heaviest period of fighting in northern France toward the end of July—the time of the breakthrough against fixed German positions. He added:

"The daily casualty lists were much lighter when I was in France than they had been. With a war of movement, such as we have now, casualties ordinarily are much less than in a war along fixed lines."

In southern France, Patterson said, army casualties for the invasion which began August 15 up to August 24 were 1247 killed

As of August 13, Patterson said army casualties were as follows: 53,101 killed, 142,686 wounded, 44,643 missing and 44,400 prisoners. Of the total wounded, 40,314 have been returned to duty.

Comparable army figures as of August 6 were: 48,880 killed, 125,931 wounded, 42,956 missing and 43,822 prisoners.

The navy casualty total of 58,353, with comparisons for the preceding week: killed 23,544 and 23,135; missing 9652 and 9593; wounded 20,701 and 19,063; prisoners 4466 and 4466.
