## TULELAKE YOUTHS NOW UNDER CURFEW

TULELAKE—Juveniles under 6 years of age will be restricted from being on streets of Tulelake after 10:30 p. m., unaccompanied by adults, or without proper written recommendation, by action of the city council in establishing a curfew law. Acts of vandalism that have increased with alarming rapidity made the drastic action necessary.

City fathers have instructed the city police to enforce the new law rigidly, which goes into immediate effect.

Chief of Police Frank G. Rhodes has fought against juvenile delinquency for several months, and the city's action is in keeping with the program that he urges.

The council further warned against bicycle riding on sidewalks at night, and reminded parents that children must not be left in parked automobiles on city streets at night while elders are attending shows. Violators will be punished, city law enforcement officers warn.
