FLYING FORTRESS TAKES ON NEW JOB

SEATTLE, Aug. 31 (AP)—The Flying Fortress has taken on another job. It has been equipped to drop a 27-foot plywood rescue boat to men at sea. The Boeing Aircraft company today reported the innovation by the army air forces material command equipment laboratory. The power-driven, well-supplied rescue craft is dropped by three parachutes. Automatically ignited smoke pots guide the sea-stranded survivors to the boat. Successfully tested in the Gulf of Mexico, where seven men lived in one of the boats for six days in one heavy sea test, the boat is reported to be in mass production. The Boeing company said that only the B-17 is equipped to carry the boats but installations are being devised for other heavy airplanes.

Ingenuity Expected To Supply Pulpwood

SEATTLE, Aug. 31 (AP)—With swar production board and manpower officials unable to promise relief in either tire or labor shortages, the west coast pulpwood industry advisory committee today looked to the ingenuity of the operators to keep the pulpwood supply at its present level. James L. Madden, deputy director of the "VPB's" paper division, congratulated west coast mills on "their resourcefulness and ingenuity in increasing their production and inventory with less manpower than they had a year ago."

Guard Company Holds Bivouac at Willow Springs

Klamath's state guard company reported a successful bivouac at Lake o' the Woods last weekend. The officers and personnel camped at Willow Springs forest camp in the lake area. Leaving here at 4 p. m. Saturday, the group arrived on schedule and immediately set up shelter tents for the temporary camp. L. L. Anderson, acting as mess officer, together with Corp. A. B. Epperson and PFC Leonard Seehorn, acting as mess detail, had left Klamath Falls two hours before the company's departure and had the evening mess ready to serve when camp had been set up and properly policed. The mounting of an informal guard was a novel experience for many of the men who had never before taken part in an actual ceremony of this nature, and those who walked post until 6:00 a. m. Sunday as part of the guard detail have a better understanding of what is required from them to insure camp security through the dark hours of night. Reveille was sounded at 6 Sunday morning with assembly 10 minutes later. Policing of the camp, and especially the company street, was engaged in by the enlisted personnel, after which Capt. MacDonald formed the company for setting-up exercises. Breakfast, consisting of cantaloupe, fried bacon and eggs, buttered toast and jelly, and steaming-hot coffee was served at 8 o'clock. Nine o'clock found the company in formation with rifles and full field packs on their backs, after striking camp, ready to start out on their practice march of eight miles, during which approach marches, deployment of men and other tactical problems were practiced. The company returned to the camp site at 3 p. m., every man having stood the march in excellent shape, and after enjoying a cool plunge in the lake, they were served hot coffee, sandwiches and potato salad by the mess detail. The trucks were again loaded and the company entrucked for Klamath Falls, where equipment was checked in at the armory and the company was dismissed. Trucks to convey the troops to and from the scene of the bivouac were furnished through the courtesy of the California Oregon Power company and Peyton company.

TENDER DECEPTION ENDS WITH DEATH

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 31 (AP)—Mrs. Julia Columbo's life ended last night—and with it one of the tenderest deceptions ever enacted in this capital of make-believe. She was the 78-year-old mother of Russ Columbo, handsome crooner and film actor. She died still happy in the belief that he was winning ever more fame abroad—mercifully unaware that actually he himself died a decade ago. Russ was killed September 2, 1934, then 26 and at the crest of a career as a night-club singer and film actor. He and friends were examining an old Civil war cap-and-ball pistol, believing it unloaded. The weapon discharged and the bullet struck him in the brain. His mother was too ill from a heart ailment to be told of his death. So each week she received a letter from "Russ." Actually it was written by her husband, Nicholas, or one of the other four children—Tony in Philadelphia; Albert, John and Mrs. Carmela Tempest here. The missive would be filled with newsy accounts, tender sentiments, reports of his successes abroad, and regrets that he was still too busy to return for a visit. Once a month the letter contained a check for \$398, supposedly from Russ. It was the payment to her from his insurance policy. The deception was continued after failing eyesight narrowed her little world. Her husband died two years ago.

Record Amount of Road Work Done

More general maintenance and improvement work has been accomplished on county roads this summer than in previous years, reports Walley Hector, county engineer. Eighteen miles of road in the vicinity of Klamath Falls have been resurfaced. The Poe valley road has been straightened in places and has received a new surface. Stretches from Altamont drive to Summers lane and along Summers lane from John's avenue to the poor farm have been oiled, and a lot of work has been done on roads in the Fort Klamath area.
