

## CONFIDENCE EXPRESSED IN FUND DRIVE

Confidence in the successful raising of Klamath county's \$65,200 goal in the first annual combined community campaign was expressed today by General Chairman John Ebinger, but only if every part of the county cooperates.

"Advance planning is now nearly complete," Ebinger stated. "Success will depend upon vigorous follow-through and generous giving. Committee and subcommittee chairmen have been carefully selected for their particular assignments. They are now selecting workers to help with the drive, and are meeting with a fine response. Everyone seems sold on the idea of a unified drive."

Corporations and individuals able to make substantial donations are being contacted prior to the opening of the general solicitation on September 11, by a committee under A. M. Collier. Rural area solicitations are being lined up under Chairman Delos Mills and Phil Hitchcock. General canvass of Klamath Falls is under the direction of L. Orth Sisemore. Payroll deductions in industrial plants will be

under the chairmanship of Mitchell Tillotson, assisted by committees from management and labor. Representatives of the various unions met with Tillotson Tuesday afternoon to plan cooperation in the drive. Present at the meeting was Nathalie E. Panek, northwest area director of the national CIO war relief committee. Miss Panek and Vernon Chase met yesterday with Secretary Charles R. Stark to discuss participation of CIO members in the campaign.

Donations by organizations, such as service clubs and fraternal groups, is being lined up by Nick Long. Contacts through the schools will be handled through the offices of Superintendents Arnold Gralapp and Fred Peterson.

## DEMO DRIVE TO RE-ELECT FOR BEGINS

The democratic drive to re-elect President Roosevelt for a fourth term in the nation's first wartime presidential campaign since the Civil War, is officially on.

The president's running-mate, Senator Harry S. Truman of Missouri, completed political formalities last night with a nomination acceptance speech at his birthplace, Lamar, Mo.

Even as Truman was declaring that the nation's efforts to make a permanent peace were "very definitely in midstream," and cautioning against entrusting such efforts to "those who are not familiar with world affairs," republicans were announcing an intensive campaign of speech-making.

Gov. John W. Bricker, the GOP vice presidential candidate, disclosed plans for speeches at Bangor and Portland, Maine, on September 22. He will make other addresses on an eastern tour starting September 18, and will make a month-long tour of the west in October.

Truman also will stump actively, with his next appearance at

Labor Day address in Detroit Monday.

Truman was notified by Senator Connally of Texas, who told a crowd that overflowed the Courthouse square that:

"The American people will not cashier the commander-in-chief of the army and navy on the field of battle."

A second triple-header broadcast by republican governors supporting Gov. Thomas E. Dewey for the presidency will be staged tonight. Governors Edward Martin of Pennsylvania, Andrew F. Schoepel of Kansas and Edward J. Thye of Minnesota will discuss issues which will be developed and expanded later in speeches by Dewey and Bricker, republican national headquarters said. The party has scheduled such three broadcasts as a prelude to Governor Dewey's opening address in Philadelphia September 7.

## RESTRICTIONS ON BEACHES REMOVED

SALEM, Sept. 1 (AP)—Restrictions on ocean beaches have been revoked by Governor Earl Snell, the governor's office announced today.

The restrictions, which went into effect shortly after Pearl Harbor, had prohibited loitering on beaches at night, use of flashlights and other signaling devices, and bonfires at night.

The restrictions had affected the entire coast and 10 miles inland.

The governor's proclamation canceling restrictions was dated August 23, but was made public only today.

Governor Snell said the western defense command advised him that restrictions no longer were necessary.
