AL DONAHUE'S BAND SLATED FOR ARMORY

Joining the parade of name bands to the Klamath Falls Armory this season is Al Donahue and his orchestra. Donahue, who brings his orchestra to the Armory Wednesday, September 6, is famous for introducing many "firsts" among popular tunes. Among the many tunes he is credited with introducing are "The Shrine of St. Cecilia," "Deep Purple," "Be Honest With Me," "Hi Neighbor," and "Why Don't We Do This More Often?"

Donahue believes that stress should be applied as much to melody as to rhythm in the modern dance band. His orchestrations are tailored accordingly.

During his appearance here, Donahue will feature his vocalists, Dick Vance and Lynne Stevens. He also features a singing group known as the Rhythmairs. "Baldy" Evans, who is booking in Donahue, predicts that this orchestra will probably be the most "durable" of the bands he has had here this season. He states that he has also scheduled the following bands for later on this season: Frankie Masters, Russ Morgan, Lionel Hampton, Jan Savit and Charlie Barnett.

BOYS HELD HERE BY AUTHORITIES

"But I didn't get in any trouble at all till I was five years old," boasted one of the two little boys being questioned by Sheriff Low Friday morning after they were picked up at the Greyhound bus station for running away from the Frasier juvenile home in Portland. The boy said he had been in and out of delinquent homes for six years.

The two boys, both 11 years old, escaped from the home by cutting the wire fence around the grounds with tin-snips stolen from the workshop, hiking to the bus station, slipping into the bus behind the driver's back, and hopping a free ride south. The bus driver became suspicious after a while and asked them for their ticket stubs, but they told him they had thrown them away. At the station here, the driver notified the city police, who took them to the juvenile office.

The boys are now in the custody of Harold Hendrickson, head juvenile officer, awaiting the arrival of their parents or officials from the Frasier home. They described the local juvenile home as an "easy break," and Sheriff Low said that he expected to see the "tough little kids out and running away in their nightgowns by tonight."

The state forestry department plans to sell about 10,000,000 feet of Douglas and white fir timber on the Yawkey tract north of Fort Klamath, it was disclosed today.

CAMP OPENED AT MEARS STATION

Pelican Bay Lumber company has set up a logging camp at Mears station, on the Southern Pacific Alturas line in Modoc county, and is logging in several million feet of timber in that area.

The purchase was made from the Red River Lumber company. About 125,000 feet of logs a day are loaded at the siding, and brought by train to the big mill here.

PUMPS ARRIVE FOR TULE LAKE PLANTS

Pumps for two Tulelake pumping plants have been received and pumps for another are expected to arrive at any time, B. E. Hayden, superintendent of the reclamation project, said today.
