



Mrs. Getz Hostess to Garden Group

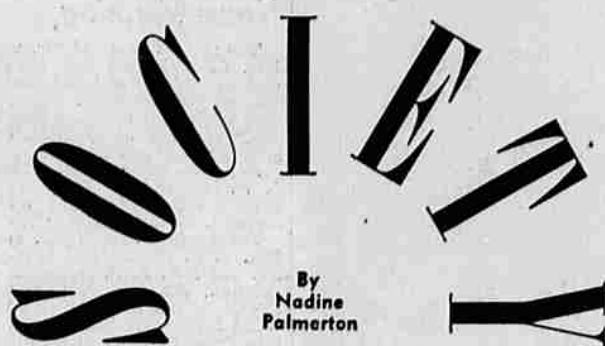
