## Homemaking Highlights

Good food for everyone, served in good proportions—that is the aim of the September Nutrition Month program which is being inaugurated this week by members of the Klamath County Nutrition Council, and other civic groups. The campaign will place a special emphasis on

the importance of a good breakfast. And right here is a good place to stop and discuss the qualities which the first meal of the day must have in order to rate an "E" for excellence.

In the first place, breakfast should be a good sized meal. It should supply the body with one third of its food requirements for 24 hours, and should be adequate to bolster up the body processes which have been carrying on all night on nothing but stored energy.

One homemaker suggests that it is a wise idea to serve five of the "basic seven" foods for breakfast. Such a menu would include a fruit, a cereal, eggs, milk, toast, coffee and bacon. Incidentally, the idea of drinking a glass of milk, even though you take coffee, is a good one, because it will insure your getting the first half of your daily milk requirement in time to start the day.

Oranges, strawberries and cantaloupe, although admittedly the best sources of vitamin C, may sometimes be given a substitute in the form of fresh tomatoes for breakfast. Because tomatoes are most abundant in local markets just now, this is a good time to try this substitution. Your family may welcome this small change from the breakfast routine.

"What goes into the worker's breakfast," goes into the worker's work, is an interesting memo for the homemaker who through long years of habit has come to regard breakfast as merely the first bit of the day's drudgery to be gotten through with as quickly as possible. A good means of maintaining the element of surprise in the meal is to make a menu for each day in the week. Then you can have time to plan an unexpected dish once or twice during the week. Make breakfast a leisurely, pleasant family gathering, not just a feeding time.

Bring 'em scrambling to breakfast with the aroma of this delicious  
**Baked Sausage on Sunshine Batter**  
1 cup enriched cornmeal  
1 cup milk, scalded  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 eggs, beaten  
Drippings to grease the pan  
1 1/2 pound pork link sausage.  
Add the cornmeal and salt to the warm milk. Stir vigorously to avoid lumps. Cool slightly, add the well-beaten eggs. Grease a 5 by 9 inch loaf pan. Pour cornmeal batter into pan. Lay sausage on top. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 35 minutes, until batter is lightly browned and sausages are done. Serves four hungry people.

Olive oil, to digress from the question of breakfast, long gone from grocer's shelves (at least the imported type) will reappear, according to war food authorities, who have made arrangements with the government of Spain for exportation of 3000 tons of the salad dressing ingredient. Of course it has many other uses, but that is, perhaps, its greatest significance to homemakers.

# Tulelake Woman Is State Legion Officer

TULELAKE — Mrs. Marvin Thomas, retiring auxiliary president of district number two, who culminated her administration with attendance at an executive board meeting which replaced the annual state convention in San Francisco recently, this week received a signal honor, having been appointed deputy marshal, a state office. It is the first time in the history of the district and of the auxiliary of Tulelake post, number 164 of the American Legion that a member of this district has held a similar position.

Mrs. Thomas also has been awarded a state citation for outstanding work completed during her year in office as district president. She has been an active auxiliary member for more than 20 years, being a past president of the Redmond, Oregon unit, a past district membership chairman in Oregon, past president of the Tulelake unit, in addition to her more recent responsible positions.
