

Nevada Primaries Top Political News; GOP Leaders to Talk

Nevada holds its primary elections today, chief interest centering in the race of Senator Pat McCarran for democratic renomination against Lt. Gov. Vail Pittman, brother of the late Senator Key Pittman.

The winner will oppose one of three republicans who are trying for their party's nomination. They are State Senator Kenneth F. Johnson of Carson City, Kendrick A. Johnson, a Reno attorney, and George W. Malone. Pittman has campaigned on a "Support President Roosevelt" platform while attacking McCarran's record as "isolationist" and anti-Roosevelt.

The CIO political action committee is a factor in the ballot battle, with McCarran's camp claiming the PAC is supporting Pittman.

Both sides claim an anticipated plurality of 3000 votes. Election officials have estimated 20,000 of the 56,818 registered voters would cast ballots today.

Democratic Representative Maurice J. Sullivan is opposed for renomination by Berkeley L. Bunker, Las Vegas, Rex Bell, Searchlight, Nev., a former film actor, is unopposed on the republican ticket.

Nationally, developments included stumping in Michigan by Senator Harry S. Truman, the democratic vice presidential nominee and broadcasts tonight (MBS at 6:15 p. m., PWT) by three republican governors helping Thomas E. Dewey's presidential campaign.

These governors are Arthur B. Langle of Washington, Harry F. Kelly of Michigan and Walter E. Edge of New Jersey. Their arguments to the voters are expected to run directly contrary to statements by Truman to a Pontiac audience yesterday that President Roosevelt is the greatest man who has ever occupied the White House.

Truman also took some pokes at Dewey, saying "we can't take a chance on inexperienced leadership."

Dewey worked toward his long speaking tour which is to begin with a Philadelphia address Thursday night. He is expected to see John Foster Dulles, his adviser on foreign affairs, in New York tomorrow.

Sculptor J. G. Davidson, chairman of the independent voters committee of the arts and sciences for Roosevelt, announced that Vice President Wallace would deliver a Roosevelt campaign speech under the committee's aegis in New York September 21.

Recruiting Specialist Dan Schreiber of the local navy recruiting station again points out to young men 17 years of age that it is absolutely necessary that they contact him several weeks prior to their 18th birthday if they want to be assured of enlisting in the navy.

Schreiber states that this is due to the fact that it takes time to secure and prepare the various pre-enlistment papers such as birth certificates, consent papers, etc. In addition to this, the applicant must leave for Portland at least five or six days before his 18th birthday.

NEGLIGENCE CAUSES DANGER OF FIRE

What could have been a serious forest fire was started recently when guests who were using Twyla Ferguson's cabin at Lake o' the Woods emptied kitchen stove ashes in the woods directly behind her cabin.

The blaze was discovered after it had spread to an area of about 60 feet by Mrs. Bess Brearcliffe and her daughter, who kept the fire in check with buckets of water until men arrived from the ranger station to put it out.

The ashes had smoldered for four days before the fire broke out and had burned almost a foot deep into the pine-needles. Cabin owners are warned by the forest ranger to put ashes in tin containers or find some other way of disposing of them that will avoid causing fire hazards.

Deane Hamilton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Hamilton, 1829 Portland, is "doing as well as can be expected" since she was injured in an automobile accident last week. FRIENDS ATTEND NORRIS' FUNERAL

McCook, Neb., Sept. 5 (P)—About 800 persons, mostly home town friends, crowded into McCook's small Methodist church yesterday to attend funeral services for George W. Norris, 83-year-old champion of popular rights. Another 100 stood silently outside.

The "father" of TVA who retired in 1942 to spend his final years in his comfortable main street home here after gaining renown as a liberal during 40 years' congressional service, was buried in the Norris family plot in McCook's Memorial park.

Dr. Bryant Drake, president of Doane college at Crete, Neb., traced Norris' life from his birth in poverty on an Ohio farm to his return here in 1942 when he said he had "never told a lie and my hand has never touched a bribe."

EXAMS SLATED HERE UNDER MERIT SYSTEM

Examinations for clerk-stenographers, senior clerk-stenographers, clerk-typists, intermediate clerks, senior clerks, telephone operators, statistical clerks, assistant statisticians, caseworker II, and caseworker III are being announced for September 30 by the merit system council. Successful applicants will be eligible for permanent appointments in offices throughout the state for the unemployment compensation commission, public welfare commission, board of health, and in Portland for the crippled children's division of the University of Oregon medical school.

Employees under the merit system, in addition to permanent tenure, receive certain privileges and rights concerning vacations and sick leaves that make positions highly desirable.

Definite standards of performance and background experience are established for each position. This is in accordance with the principles of merit system administration in seeking the best possible employees for the positions in the service and providing them with the best possible personnel services and rights.

Detailed information and ap-

plication forms may be secured at any of the local offices of the departments mentioned above, but must be returned to the Merit System Council, 616 Mead Building, Portland 4, by September 18 for inclusion in the present examination program. Examinations will be held in central locations throughout the state, depending on the number of applicants from the district.
