

M'Carran Ahead in Nevada Vote; GOP Governors Blast FDR

Senator Pat McCarran held an 853-vote lead today in a sharp political contest in Nevada as ballot-counting neared conclusion in his democratic renomination try against Lt. Gov. Vail Pittman.

And on the national scene, with presidential elections hardly two months off, there came new attacks on the new deal from republican governors.

In the Nevada primaries, on the basis of returns from 249 of 283 precincts, the standing was: McCarran 10,441; Pittman 9586.

McCarran, who has been in the senate two terms, was praised by his friends as an independent thinker to do what was best for his people. He was attacked as an "isolationist" by the Pittman camp, who boomed their man with a "support President Roosevelt" battle cry.

McCarran supporters said Pittman received aid from the CIO political action committee.

George W. Malone was conceded the republican senatorial nomination.

Final figures were not announced immediately but an early count gave Malone nearly 2 to 1 over Kenneth F. Johnson with Kendrick A. Johnson trailing.

Governor Thomas E. Dewey got set meanwhile to start on his active speech-making campaign, bulwarked by three more of his republican governor colleagues who told radio audiences last night that his election to the presidency is imperatively needed.

Speaking under auspices of the republican national committee which released the copies of their prepared addresses, were Governors Edge of New Jersey, Kelly of Michigan and Langlie of Washington. Among other points:

Edge—President Roosevelt "has failed signally to meet and solve our domestic economic difficulties" while Governor Dewey "has successfully governed a great state and will demonstrate his grasp of foreign affairs."

Kelly—The Roosevelt administration "has not hesitated to divide the American people or condone the actions of others who spread the doctrine of hate."

Langlie—"There is a feeling on every hand that our national government is no longer of the people. Four more years of this trend would place a disheartening damper upon our hope for a more bounteous life."

But from Representative McCormack (D-Mass.), came his appraisal of Mr. Roosevelt in a radio speech:

"No matter how much one might disagree with the president on some of his domestic policies, everyone will agree that he has unlimited courage and that his conduct of the war has been superb."

Dewey is to make a major speech at Philadelphia tomorrow night and follow it up with a tour across the country. His New York City schedule today
