struction of greater East Asia is progressing step by step."

**Situation Intense**

"However," he said, "the counteroffensive of the enemy is becoming increasingly fierce and the war situation is finally becoming more intense. Truly today is the time for imperial Japan to decide the victory by massing her total strength."

Premier Koiso, making his first speech to the diet since he took over the government from Gen. Hideki Tojo last July, said that "in the face of the present grave situation, the existence of a single idle person or a single bystander, regardless of age or sex, cannot be tolerated."

**Demands Effort**

He demanded maximum effort under Japan's total mobilization plan.

"At the present stage of the war—when enemy attacks upon our homeland are likely to increase in frequency and scale and we might do well to consider the possibility of their landing on our home soil—we must indeed concentrate our total power and, with burning enthusiasm to safeguard our national policy by offering our all and with renewed determination to fight through this war, exhaust every means in our human possession while praying for divine guidance to our august deities with purity of heart."

**Life at Stake**

He declared the rise or fall of the empire and "the life or death of the Yamato (Japanese) race" were at stake.

The premier's war review, at the opening of the diet's 85th extraordinary session, was described in a Tokyo broadcast reported by the Federal Communications commission.

## Bombers Smash At Nazi Convoy

ROME, Sept. 7 (AP)—Flying from new bases in southern France, American Thunderbolts have smashed at a fleeing Nazi convoy within 20 miles of the German frontier, the Mediterranean allied air force announced today.

At least 30 vehicles were destroyed.

Three locomotives were blown up, nine others were damaged, it was announced. A tank, field gun and 15 railcars were destroyed.

July 25-26 when they blasted a concentration of Japanese shipping.

The Palau have been one of Japan's most useful and secret bases for years. Now it is one of the few remaining to her as a link between the Philippines and the Carolines and Marshalls.

**Paramushiro Hit**

In addition to the attacks on the Palau the navy press release said Ventura search planes bombed Paramushiro and Onnekolan, in the Kuriles and straited barges and patrol boats in that sector the same day.

Planes of the seventh AAF continued raids in small force on Iwo Jima island, in the Volcano group 750 miles south of Tokyo. They also blasted Nauru, phosphate island south of the Marshalls.

## DO YOU LIKE GRAPE JELLY?

This Delicious Recipe Saves Sugar

For jelly making, Concord grapes are best. All blue grapes, however, are NOT Concord. Be sure you get Concord when you ask for them.

**CONCORD GRAPE JELLY**

5 Cups Concord Juice  
7 Cups Sugar  
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

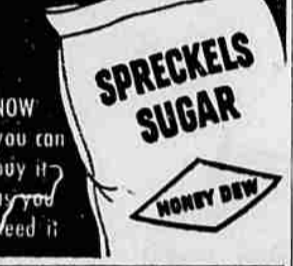
Wash and crush 3 1/2 pounds fully ripe grapes. Add 1 1/2 cups water and simmer, covered, 10 minutes. Squeeze out juice. Measure exactly 5 level cups squeezed juice (add water to fill last cup, if necessary) into a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin, stir well, bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), continue stirring, and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 2 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, skim carefully. Pour into sterilized glasses, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.

**WHITE GRAPE JELLY**

3 1/2 Cups Squeezed Juice  
4 1/2 Cups Sugar  
1 Cup Lemon Juice  
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Use seedless Muscat or Malagas. Wash and stem about 3 pounds of grapes. Add 1 1/2-cup water and simmer, covered, 25 minutes. Squeeze out juice then, using proportions above, follow same procedure as in making Concord Grape Jelly.
