mire usually begin in mid-September. Bad weather would confront the red high command with new difficulties in trying to break the deadlock on a front extending from the vicinity of East Prussia to the approaches of Krakow.

(Berlin reported that the Russians had opened a new offensive on the route to Krakow in southern Poland).

Russian and Romanian forces won strategic control of southern Transylvania with the occupation of the communications center of Sibiu and soviet tanks and shock troops were pushing rapidly on toward the Mures river, which flows into the Hungarian plain. Russian armor had driven within 128 miles of the flat open frontier of Hungary.

nin island groups—between 500 and 700 miles from Japan.

At two Jima on Wednesday and Thursday, big army bombers hit air fields starting several fires and encountering only moderate anti-aircraft fire. One of four enemy fighter planes in the air on Thursday probably was destroyed.

At Chichi Jima in the Bonin islands, other Liberator bombers damaged an enemy cargo ship found in the harbor there. On the same day, rocket and machine gun fire from American planes was turned on Pagan island in the northern part of the Marianas island group.

Quebec Set as Scene of Meeting

QUEBEC, Sept. 9 (AP)—Quebec city will be the scene of the next meeting between Prime Minister Winston Churchill and President Roosevelt at a date yet to be decided.

The two leaders, who have not met since they were at Tehran last November, will plan the conquest of Japan as well as the final phases of the European war.

Smythe Offered Presidency of Hockey League

MONTREAL, Sept. 9 (AP)—Major Connie Smythe, 49, former manager of the Toronto Maple Leafs who was wounded while serving in Normandy with his sportsman's battery, yesterday was offered the presidency of the National hockey league by the board of governors.

Pending a decision on whether Maj. Smythe will accept the post, Mervyn "Red" Dutton will continue to act as president with Lester Patrick, of the New York Rangers, as general manager. The governors explained that Dutton's western business would keep him from league headquarters from time to time and that Patrick, as general manager, would have full authority in Dutton's absence.

Among the rule changes adopted was one which would bar any player from the league who has been deferred under selective service regulations either in Canada or the United States for any reason other than physical disability.

main reason for Russia's hesitation is believed to be the Russo-Polish dispute, aggravated by the present Warsaw situation.

The Russians have shown considerable determination to settle their quarrel with the Poles without outside interference, rejecting an offer of good offices from this country.

Reject Base Request

They also rejected, it was learned, a British request to use Russian bases on the Italian-Soviet shuttle run for sending aid to the embattled people of Warsaw, waging open war against the Germans while the red army is poised a few miles away.

As a consequence, the RAF attempted to take supplies direct to Warsaw from British bases, and is reported to have suffered very heavy losses on the return trip to England.

Former Resident Dies In Portland

Charles Mesner, a resident of Klamath county for many years, passed away Friday in a Portland hospital, it was learned here Saturday. Mr. Mesner, who worked in the lumber industry here, had been ill several months and had been in Portland for his health since the latter part of June.

He is survived by his wife, Dessie Mesner of this city, two brothers, Harry and Arthur of this city and two sisters, Mrs. Bertha Worden of Portland and Mrs. Daisy Day of San Leandro, Calif.

Funeral services will be held in Portland Monday afternoon with interment at the Lincoln Memorial park mausoleum.

on the Caen-St. Lo line. Gallagher told how American Black Widow night fighters were ranging into the reach smashing convoys rushing troops across the Rhine.

Sap Reserves

The Germans were reported scraping together garrison forces, training battalions and anything else available until it was doubtful whether there were now five field force divisions in the whole of interior Germany. The sapping of strategic reserve strength would leave the heart of the reich barren of defense once a real breakthrough was made—just as was France when the allies in the north smashed into the open five weeks ago.

For that breakthrough Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's great battle team was moving into final assault positions—under a security blackout of news—along 400 miles of the German frontier at key points ranging from 15 to 25 miles in front of the Siegfried line.

Week's Gains

These were the allied gains of the week which carried the fight to the German border:

The Canadians pushed 80 miles up along the Calais coast.

The British drove 110 miles from Vimy Ridge to the Dutch border.

The American first army thrust 80 miles from the Belgian border past Liege and to within 15 miles of the Siegfried's outer defenses.

The American third army drove up to 35 miles from the Meuse to across the Moselle.

Three American armies and a British army were being employed in the gigantic operation.

Yank Positions

These were the positions of the American armies:

The first army in Belgium drove beyond the captured Belgian fortress city of Liege to less than 18 miles from the German frontier in the vicinity of Aachen.

The third army had crossed the Moselle river in five places around Metz and Nancy in eastern France, and had crushed a large-scale German counter-attack.

Holds Bridgehead

To the north the British second army held its five-mile deep bridgehead over the Albert canal against increasing fierce resistance as the Germans battled to stem this flanking sweep toward the northern anchor of the Siegfried line at Cleve, a German border town, 65 miles southeast of Amsterdam.

Aachen, toward which Lt. Gen. Courtney H. Hodges' first army troops were driving, was the original northern anchor of the Siegfried line, but the Germans in 1939 lastly extended the line 65 miles farther north to Cleve. The German defense zone now extends well in front of Aachen.

Patton's gasoline-thirsty third army was supplied by a sky train of C-47 transport planes which landed on forward airstrips. It was a lack of supplies which first slowed up the third army.

Supreme headquarters masked the exact positions of the forward elements of the four allied armies, concealing from the Germans which columns were engaged in feints and which would deliver the smashing blow designed to breach the Nazi line and fan out into the interior of Hitler's final fortress, Germany.

Finnigan Enters Councilman Race
