Homemaking Highlights

From the Office of the Home Demonstration Agent
HOMEMADE jams and jellies are a great treat to the men and women overseas in the armed services. For that reason, Mrs. Winnifred Gillen, Klamath county home demonstration agent, is offering her tin can sealers to be used by groups of homemakers in the Klamath area who would like to send homemade sweets to the fighting fronts. Because her time is limited, she suggests that homemakers in a given community bring their preserves to one home, and process it in the final stages there so that she may seal several cans at one time. Tin cans and postal regulations governing the mailing of these foods may be obtained from her office in the postoffice building.

A NEW VARIETY of nectarines is being shown this week by one grocer in Klamath Falls, who maintains that they are more attractive for canning purposes than the hitherto familiar kinds we have come to expect to find in local stores because of their mottled, rich red skins. The meat is the same light color of a ripe Gravenstein apple. They are termed "blood nectarines."

foods, and some time-honored recipes which you will want to add to your collection if you do not have them now. For instance, a rather hearty salad recipe contained in the tomato booklet is this:

Combine diced tomatoes, cooked kidney beans, chopped celery, served pickle or pickle relish; season with minced onion, salt, and pepper. Moisten with salad dressing.

FOODS that went off the ration point list last week are as follows: Jams and jellies, preserves and fruit butters of all kinds, canned and bottled asparagus, lima beans, corn peas, pumpkin, squash, mixed vegetables, canned baked beans, tomato sauce and paste, tomato puree and pulp, soups, baby foods, green and wax beans, beets, carrots, spinach and beans.

MRS. MERLE ADAMS called this office yesterday to inquire whether home-processed tin cans of fruit may be presumed to be spoiled if the top and bottom of the tins bulge. Manufacturers of home canning apparatus advise that in most instances, food in such tins should be discarded. However, in the case of some fruits, notably berries, swelling is sometimes caused by the generation of hydrogen within the can by the action of the fruit juice on the tin coating of the can. In this type of swelling, small perforations appear in the ends of the can, and if the food is used before the perforations appear, this type of bulging is not a mark of spoilage. Bacteria swelling usually occurs within a few days after the food has been processed, and in that case the food should not be used.
