Motion to Quash Indictments Denied To Jap-Americans

BOISE, Idaho, Sept. 9 (AP)—Three Japanese-Americans from the Minidoka relocation center at Hunt yesterday sought to evade prosecution for selective service violation by declaring they had sworn allegiance to "the emperor of Japan," but Federal Judge Chase A. Clark denied their motion to quash the indictments.

The trio contended they were held by the federal government under duress and were not citizens of the United States. After the motions were denied, the men were arraigned and pleaded innocent.

Thirty-five Japanese-Americans from Hunt and eight others were indicted by a grand jury this week for selective service violations.

PAPER COLLECTION HITS RECORD

Volunteer collections of paper in Oregon hit a mark during August, when amounts gathered, totaling amounts reported for previous months.

Klamath county collected only about 1/84 of the tonnage gathered in the state. But it is still among the top counties ranked according to capita collection since the beginning of the campaign, averaging of 24.2 lbs. of paper per person has been recorded here since November.

No waste paper collection has been reported in Lake County since March. Lake county's capita average for the entire year is 8.1 lbs.
