

REV. TOPNESS INSTALLED AT SERVICE HERE

Installation services for the Rev. S. M. Topness, new pastor of the Klamath Lutheran church were held at the morning worship Sunday. Dr. H. L. Foss, of Seattle, president of the Pacific district of the Evangelical Lutheran church was in charge of the installation service. Summoning the officers of the congregation to the foot of the chancel steps, Dr. Foss directed the usual questions to them as well as to the new pastor.

In his address Dr. Foss stated that 70 per cent of the people of the west coast are unchurched and that there is a great field for pastoral work. "The Lutheran church has a definite contribution to make to the community in winning souls for Christ and it must be ever alert to its opportunities," declared the speaker.

In his initial sermon, Topness used the words of Christ as his text: "My meat is to do the will of Him that sent me and to finish his work. Lift up your eyes and look on the fields; for they are white already unto harvest."

The speaker complimented the congregation on its energetic endeavors in building its beautiful leadership of Chaplain L. K. Johnson, who served as its pastor for several years. "Now," said the speaker, "Klamath Lutheran must continue to build in another way, gathering in souls that God's house may be filled." The Rev. Topness stated that his purpose could best be set forth in the words of an unknown poet who wrote:

"I do not ask that men may sound my praises
Or headlines spread my name abroad,
I only pray that as I voice the message
Hearts may find God."

Hornby, violinist, and anthems by the senior and junior choirs under the direction of the organist, Mrs. C. R. Brandness.

The congregation held open house in honor of Pastor and Mrs. Topness in the church parlors at 5 p. m. Mrs. H. O. Solie presided. Talks were given by Dr. H. L. Foss, Mrs. V. J. Gustafson, the Rev. and Mrs. Topness. Refreshments were served and a social hour enjoyed at which time all were given an opportunity to meet the new pastor and his wife.

DEWEY SCORES DEMOS; SAYS CHANGE NEEDED

DES MOINES, Sept. 11 (AP)—Calling the Byrnes reconversion report "a start," Gov. Thomas E. Dewey asserted today that a change in administration is needed if this country's industry is to be shifted over to peacetime pursuits smoothly and efficiently.

Arriving here for conferences with political, labor, farm and other leaders, the republican presidential nominee told a throng which gathered around his campaign train at the railroad station that their presence indicated to him that a new administration must be elected "to achieve the essential object of American life—equality between labor, industry and agriculture."

After a ride through crowded downtown streets to a hotel, the New York governor answered questions fired at him by about 200 reporters at a news conference.

He was asked for comment on the report of War Mobilization Director James F. Byrnes, which outlined the steps for a proposed 40 per cent cutback in war production after hostilities with Germany are concluded.

"At least," Dewey said, "that's a start."

He said he pointed out in Pittsburgh six weeks ago that the Roosevelt administration was "six months late" in planning for an industrial change-over.

"Now," he said, "the administration is only seven and a half months late. My earnest hope is that this proposal means action and is not just more words. There is a gigantic undertaking ahead just to get government property out of war plants. It requires long and skillful planning of a sort that we have never had from this administration."

In response to questions, Dewey said he agreed with the view recently expressed by Wendell L. Willkie in a magazine article that a strong foreign policy must be backed up by a strong economic condition at home.
