In fact, one is justified in wondering if the native common sense of our people isn't more to be trusted than the outgivings of some of our alleged leaders.

In New York the other day, Mayor La Guardia got out of his system the supposedly serious statement that we should now proceed to DESTROY such surplus materials as will not provide employment for war workers!

What are these materials? Well, they include such things as food, shoes, clothing, blankets and similar consumer necessities. Their estimated value runs far into the billions—maybe as much as 15 or 20 billions. They are all things that people want now and NEED now.

Imagine a serious proposal to destroy them at this particular moment!

ASIDE from the economic sin inherent in the deliberate destruction of things that contribute to the welfare of human beings, consider the effect of such destruction of consumer goods upon inflation, that ogre that threatens us always when money is more plentiful than the things to spend it for.

The way to head off inflation is to keep goods ABUNDANT ENOUGH to prevent the skyrocketing of prices. The sure way to BRING ON inflation is to reduce the supply of goods materially below the supply of money.

That is exactly what La Guardia is proposing to do DELIBERATELY.

IF we are to PROMOTE inflation by artificial foolishness such as destroying existing supplies of food, clothing, etc., we must then proceed to RESTRAIN it by such artificial devices as rationing and price control.

The inevitable and necessary result of La Guardia's absurd proposal, if it were carried out, would be to extend OPA and rationing much farther into the future than would otherwise be required.

CIVIL SERVICE OFFICER COMES

To assist government projects in and around Klamath Falls with their labor procurement problems, Eugene Liljenquist, representative of the United States Civil Service commission, has moved his branch office from Medford to Klamath Falls, where he has set up headquarters in the local U. S. employment office.

Liljenquist's efforts will be centered chiefly on employing persons for the Marine Barracks, the navy base, and the Tulelake project, but he will take applications for any type of Civil Service position here or in other parts of the country.

Workers for the new laundry opened recently at the Marine Barracks and skilled tradesmen in practically any line for employment at the naval air station are especially needed now, Liljenquist stated.

Workers who are not now employed in essential work may apply at the U. S. employment office for a Civil Service position.

Dewey to Confer in Portland

PORTLAND, Sept. 13 (AP)—Thomas E. Dewey, republican presidential nominee, will spend a busy day here Tuesday. A series of conferences will be climaxed by a radio broadcast to the nation from 7:30 to 8 p. m.

Gov. Earl Snell will greet the New York governor when he arrives at 9:30 a. m. Dewey then will meet newspaper men, party officials and leaders of labor and negro groups.

He will confer at noon with delegates to the Oregon Republican club's annual state convention, then will attend a 1 o'clock luncheon presided over by Niel R. Allen, state GOP chairman. Conferences with Oregon precinct committeemen and agricultural leaders will follow.

MATTOON, Ill., Sept. 13 (AP)—Mattoon's mysterious gas-spraying night prowler, state and city police officials have theorized, is non-existent, and the excitement resulting from repeated reports of his alleged attacks during the last two weeks, they said, was "a mistake from beginning to end."

The third army forces that shot up from Aumetz to the Luxembourg-Germany frontier poured devastating fire from artillery and tanks into the Siegfried line for more than two hours today.

Fail to Respond
The Germans failed to respond. Possibly they were simply waiting. But their guns might have been knocked out, or they might even have withdrawn from forward posts, in the west wall there.

The northernmost invasion army was battling beyond Rotgen.

Rotgen is six miles east of Eupen, Belgian border town from which the first army launched its northernmost breakthrough into Germany.

No Reports
There was no news of the other invasion column which burst five miles into the reich 65 miles farther south, northwest of Trier.

Other American columns on the northern sector of the front had thrust to or near the reich's frontier at two or more points.

Berlin's broadcast of loss of a west wall outpost was the first disclosure to the German people that the ground war had surged into their homeland.

The invasions, gaining new power from reinforcements of men and armor, have struck from Eupen in Belgium to a point 10 miles south of Aachen, a Siegfried line bastion, and five miles into Germany northwest of Trier from Luxembourg.

Service Group to Meet Tonight

The Klamath military service committee and the service center advisory committee will meet tonight at the chamber of commerce rooms, it was reported today by Chairman Clarence Humble.

Plans for continued operation of the local service center will be shaped at the meeting. Klamath Commandos will disembark on Saturday midnight after two years of carrying the service center responsibility here.

German General Accused of Plot

LONDON, Sept. 13 (AP)—The German radio announced tonight the arrest of a Gen. Lindemann, accused in the July 20 alleged plot on Hitler's life.

The broadcast said the "general—on whose head a reward of 500,000 marks had been posted—was caught in the house of a half-Jew civil engineer" in Berlin.

Previous German broadcasts had named "General of Artillery Fritz Lindemann," accused of deserting to the Russians, as a participant in the anti-Hitler plot.

WOULD SAVE COAL

and his Russians approached within 25 miles of Cluj, capital of central Transylvania, largest Romanian city still in enemy hands. He broke a permanent fortified line which Romanians had been building since 1940 when Hitler wanted them the northern half of the Romanian province.

His drive also directly threatened Arad, another important center 10 miles from the Mures river. Cluj has a city of 100,000. Timisoara has 90,000 and Arad 76,000.

big island lying west of the Guinea and south of the Philippines. Near Manado on the northeast coast, airbase ways were cratered and built up of service, barracks were damaged and waterfront installations damaged. There was no interception.

Halmahera Hit
Halmahera, between Celebes and New Guinea, suffered a tank by a strong force of Libyators, which worked their way on airfields, supply dumps and defense positions. Many were started. Again, there was no interception.

Ceram, south of Halmahera was hit with 125 bombs which exploded on airbase, oil installations and coastal defenses. Heavy blasts were off and large fuel fires started. There three parked transport planes were destroyed, but an aircraft fire shot down an enemy number of allied aircraft.

During the Sunday and Monday strikes the southwest Pacific raiders sank one freighter beached another with a direct hit and destroyed or damaged four other vessels.

The reduction of Japanese forces trapped on British New Guinea continued, with this reporting 504 more killed and 116 taken prisoner. Twenty-five friendly nationals were created by allied troops.
