

DEWEY BLASTS NEW DEAL FOR REGIMENTATION

SHERIDAN, Wyo., Sept. 14 (AP)—Governor Thomas E. Dewey, arriving in Sheridan for conferences with Wyoming republican leaders, told a crowd of 500 persons at the railway station that the voters this year have a choice "going down the new deal road to complete regimentation or up the republican road to a free society where we can achieve security and jobs for all."

The republican presidential nominee, who arrived here at 10 a. m. (MWT), after an overnight train ride from Valentine, Neb., appeared on the rear platform with Mrs. Dewey as the crowd cheered and a local band played.

Dewey explained that he was not making speeches this week but was "seeing the people" all the way from Michigan to Oregon.

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"One man managed to make a depression last for 11 years and that is an incredible record."

CANADIAN CHARGED WITH 18 OFFENSES

VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept. 14 (AP)—Alfred LaPlante, 36, today awaited trial on five charges of rape, five of burglary with intent to commit rape, three of robbery with violence, one of carrying an offensive weapon, one of possessing burglar tools, one of attempted robbery with violence, one of burglary and one of theft of a gun.

LaPlante was committed for trial on the charges after preliminary hearings in police court yesterday before Magistrate H. S. Wood. The crown entered stays of proceedings on charges of indecent assault and of retaining stolen property.

On the witness stand five women identified LaPlante as the man who had assaulted them in their homes, testifying they had been awakened in the early morning hours and under threats of a knife or gun forced to submit to the attacker. The offenses occurred in Vancouver east end homes from April to August this year, according to testimony.

LaPlante, unrepresented by counsel, declined all offers of the court to examine witnesses. Two detectives submitted a two-page statement in which LaPlante admitted his guilt on one charge.
