

RODEO SWINGS INTO ACTION AT PENDLETON

PENDLETON, Ore., Sept. 14 (P)—Under leaden skies, Pendleton's 33rd round-up swung into action this afternoon with thousands of visitors on hand to watch the nation's top cowhands compete for honors at this oldest and most famous wild west show.

Revived after a three-year wartime closure, this three-day round-up is expected to be one of the greatest in history. Indicative is the greatest advance ticket sale of all time, an increase over 1941 from 157 to 180 in the number of bronco-busting cowpokes entered in the various events, and a boost in the number and quality of the 1100 head of livestock to appear in the round-up arena.

This flag-bedecked eastern Oregon city virtually halted regular business as all interest centered on the lungeing, rearing broncos, vicious long-horned steers, and the wiry sons of the range vying for the \$8925 in prize money and coveted points counting toward world championships.

Today's crowd is expected to number more than 5000 with the influx of spectators increasing sharply for the final two days of the show. Capacity attendance of 20,000 to 25,000 is anticipated Friday and Saturday.

Interest will center on efforts by three two-time winners to gain permanent possession of the \$5000 sterling silver Sam Jackson trophy, offered by the Oregon Journal of Portland in memory of the late C. S. Jackson to the all-around cowboy champion.

Needing only a third leg to own the prize, Everett Brown, man of Hillside, Ariz., Ike Rude of Mangum, Okla., and Bill McMacken of Trail City, S. D. If any one of them cops the trophy he will be given an extra \$500 in war bonds by the round-up association.

Five major events are on the program, championship bucking, steer roping and bulldogging, calf roping and brahma steer riding, and contestants for the Jackson trophy must be entered in at least two of them.

Twenty-six years after the photo above was snapped, history repeats itself, with victorious Allied troops pounding along the cobble streets of Coblenz, Germany. The Yank soldiers above are members of the U. S. Third Army of World War I, known as the Army of Occupation. A month after the armistice, they crossed the Rhine and established themselves in Coblenz. American occupying troops remained in Coblenz until 1923, when they turned the area over to the French.

At dawn, when the fog turned to a slight drizzle, the uninjured civilian passengers were taken to nearby Clinton for breakfast and the unhurt soldiers were brought to the armory here. Later all of them were put aboard another train and resumed their trip southward.

The engine, tender, two baggage cars and the first two of three Pullmans on the Dixie Flyer left the track and piled up along the roadway. All cars of the other train held the track.

The first two Pullmans of the Flyer carried only soldiers. A major, who declined to give his name, said all of the men were overseas airforce veterans, most of whom wore the Purple Heart. He said they were on 30-day furloughs, after which they were to have been taken to redistribution centers.

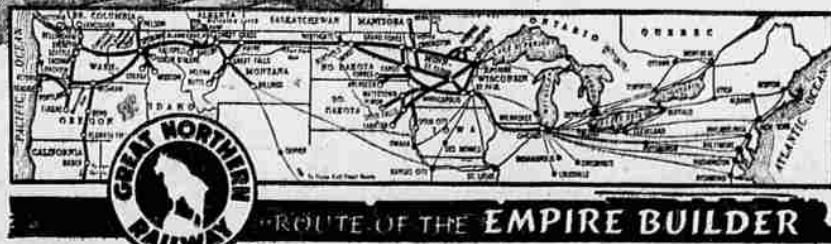
