FORMATION SLATED FOR PELICAN USE

For the first time, Klamath football fans this year will see the Pelicans using the T formation. It was disclosed yesterday at the Kiwanis club meeting by Marble Cook, Pelican coach.

Cook explained the workings of the T to the Kiwanians and said he believes the local squad will adapt itself satisfactorily to this system as the season advances.

Under ex-Oregon State men as coaches for a dozen years, power football has been the general rule on Pelican teams. The T will display a more open game and lends itself to wide versatility in plays. Key man in the T is the quarterback, and Cook said he has been grooming young Bob Perkins for that spot.

Cook said that it is the purpose of his staff to indoctrinate the boys with ideas of good sportsmanship and clean play, and not merely to win football games. He suggested that Klamath Falls fans might do well to learn that sometimes football games will be lost, but that if the boys do their best and play hard and clean, they should be given the sort of acclamation they receive when they win.

Cook added that he had found the Klamath boys to be the "cleanest group of football players" he had ever worked with.

Joe Peak, high school physical education director, introduced Cook, who played football in Idaho and later attended the University of Oregon. Stanley Woodruff, high school principal, was chairman of the day.

ALIENS SENTENCED FOR SELLING SAKI

NEWELL — Three Japanese aliens accused of making and selling saki were given 90 days' suspended sentences and put on probation for one year yesterday at the Tulake center by Acting Project Director Harry L. Black, the war relocation authority reported.

The three men are Yumekichi Sakurada, 42, formerly of Davis, Calif.; Hideyoshi Murakami, 42, formerly of San Jose, and Cenkoku Keunji, 59, formerly of Sacramento.

The first two are charged with making and selling the rice wine and the third with selling it.

Information indicates that it was referred originally to the United States district attorney who recommended that the men be given disciplinary trials at the project in conformance with WRA regulations.
