KLAMATH FUND DRIVE NEARING 1-3 OF QUOTA

Klamath's combined community fund had reached approximately \$20,000 today, still less than one-third of the quota, and Drive Chairman John E. Binger urged that people give as generously as possible to push the campaign ahead more rapidly.

"We aren't doing our part for local, state and national social service causes by giving one cent less than this quota," said Binger. "We who live in safety and comparative ease in this fine country can surely spare the cash for this worthy purpose."

Binger added that he is pleased with the generous response made by many of the people and firms of the county, and that the spirit of the campaign is excellent.
