

RAMBO WINS 2 PENDLETON COWBOY CUPS

PENDLETON, Sept. 19 (P)—The Sam Jackson and John Hamley trophies, emblematic of the all-around cowboy championship, were in the possession of Gene Rambo, Shandon, Calif., cowboy today, following one of the most successful round-ups in the history of the event.

Delores Stevens of McKay, Ore., will reign as Indian beauty queen for the coming year. She competed with 20 other full-blooded Indian beauties for the title.

The all-around performance was unusually good and the crowds equalled or exceeded all previous years, officials said.

ONE KILLED, THREE INJURED IN WRECK

CASTLE ROCK, Wash., Sept. 19 (P)—One man was killed and three others injured last night when a Great Northern freight train traveling on the main line sidetracked a Northern Pacific freight pulling out from a siding 100 feet north of the station, state patrol radio reported.

A. R. Hansen of Kirkland, Great Northern brakeman, was killed.

Injured were: Lloyd Jones, Great Northern fireman from Puyallup, both legs broken and severe lacerations; Ray Foster, Seattle, Great Northern engineer, lacerations, bruises and shock; Charles Conn, Puyallup and Auburn, possible back injury, bruises and shock.

Ten cars were derailed, one engine completely overturned and both locomotives knocked loose from their tenders. Both tracks of the line used jointly by the Northern Pacific, Great Northern, Union Pacific and Milwaukee railroads were torn up and covered with wreckage.

Bricker to Make Coast Jaunt

CHICAGO, Sept. 19 (P)—Gov. John W. Bricker of Ohio, who stumped through the Pacific Northwest in quest of the republican presidential nomination, will return there next month as the party's vice presidential candidate, republican western campaign headquarters announced.

Bricker will begin a 9250 mile campaign tour on October 1 which will take him into the northwest, down the Pacific coast and through the mountain states and the southwest. He will speak in 20 states and confer with party leaders in several others.

His northwest visit was set tentatively as October 9.

Ralph Macartney To Open Investment Office in Klamath

LOWELL STOCKMAN ON TRIP TO FRANCE

LONDON, Sept. 19 (P)—A "congressional invasion" of France was arranged today by Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower after nine members of the U. S. house told the supreme commander they believed that they were being blocked from the trip by lesser military authorities.

Eight representatives probably will leave tomorrow on an inspection tour which will include Cherbourg, possibly Brussels, supply bases, an advance hospital, the Maginot line and perhaps the Siegfried line to study the equipment of the troops, how they are faring in the fields and the operation of lend-lease, and civil affairs.

Three more representatives have arrived in London, boosting to 12 the total now here. The new arrivals were: Walt Horan (R-Wash.), Chet Hollifield (D-Calif.), and Lowell Stockman, (R-Ore.).

Rep. Walker H. Judd, (R-Minn.), left for China.

DFC AWARDED TO LT. ROY PROPST

FIFTH AIR FORCE, SOUTH-WEST PACIFIC—First Lieut. Roy N. Propst, son of Mrs. L. E. McGonagle, McCloud, Cal., was recently awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for flight missions as pilot of a troop carrier airplane. He is the grandson of Mrs. C. F. Bamber, formerly of Klamath Falls, Ore., and is a graduate of Klamath Union high school.

Lieutenant Propst has piloted planes with loads totaling more than 2,000,000 pounds since he came overseas. Troop carrier planes have flown men, supplies and equipment to battle fronts in every campaign in New Guinea, New Britain and the Admiralty Islands. Fifth air force troop carrier units are commanded by Brigadier General Warren R. Carter.

Major General Ennis C. Whitehead, fifth air force commander, recently commended the troop carriers for making possible the rapid allied advance in Dutch New Guinea. The big C-47 workhorse planes have flown paratroopers in the combined air, sea and land assaults which have been typical of Southwest Pacific war.

Lieutenant Propst enlisted in the army air forces September 9, 1940, and received his flight training at Blythe and Bakersfield, Cal.

Practice Bombs Fall From Planes

WALLA WALLA, Sept. 19 (P)—Accidental dropping of small practice bombs near Hermiston and Boardman, Ore., last week has resulted in new orders that bomb bay doors shall not be opened until bombers are over the ranges. Col. David Wade, commanding officer of the Walla Walla air base, announced last night.

Wade said the bombs accidentally worked loose from the racks and fell through open bomb bay doors of B-24 bombers. Bombs used here, however, have only sufficient powder to make a smoke for target identification, he said.

Oregon Journal Supports FDR

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 19 (P)—The Oregon Journal, independent Portland newspaper which opposed President Roosevelt's third term bid and supported Wendell Willkie, came out for Roosevelt's reelection today.

In an editorial the paper termed Mr. Roosevelt "the leading figure in the allied strategy both of war and peace," and declared that "the issues of the presidential election and of war and peace are inseparable."

Thomas E. Dewey, the republican presidential nominee, "has not loomed large upon the stage of world events," the editorial said, "and the arguments

for his election lack the force they would possess in normal times."
