

BLUE POINT HIKE OFFSETS RATION SLASH

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19 (AP)—Housewives who went shopping today learned at first hand that skyrocketed blue point values had offset a reduction in the list of rationed processed foods.

New point values generally were about double the former ones, but in some cases the increases were even greater.

For example, a No. 2 can of tomatoes (18 ounces) which used to cost 5 points, today required 20, and the same sized can of tomato juice was up from 6 to 20 points.

Peaches, pears and pineapple, which had an old point value of 43 points, have been increased to 80 points. Pineapple juice went up from 25 to 50 points for a 14-ounce container.

Point values of canned apples, applesauce, apricots, all varieties of berries, cherries, figs, fruit cocktail and plums and prunes were about doubled, but some increases exceeded 100 per cent.

These point values are higher, not because of a change in the supply picture of the commodities remaining under rationing, but because of the removal from rationing of nearly all vegetables, special products and all fruit spreads, effective September 17, as requested by the war food administration.

Price Administrator Chester Bowles said.

Point values had to be increased because removal of vegetables and many other products from rationing, in effect, gave the housewife a great increase in point buying power. She still has 50 points per month for each person for whom she buys food. Instead of using them for vegetables, spreads and special products as well as fruit juices, she now has to use them only for fruits, some juices, canned tomatoes, catsup and chili sauce.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Sept. 19 (AP)—One person was killed and six injured in a headon automobile collision on the Pacific highway a mile north of here yesterday.

Valerie Kuning, 18, Longview, was fatally injured. The others were brought to hospitals here. Albert Strohmeyer, 52, Vancouver, driver of one of the cars, is being held by the county prosecutor. Maurice Leak, 18, Longview, driver of the other car, suffered right leg and arm fractures.

HUNT CONTINUES FOR MISSING PLANE

SUSANVILLE, Calif., Sept. 19 (AP)—Navy planes and ships of the civil air patrol joined today in a search for Peggy Ellis, 25, and George Davis, 26, both of Alturas, missing in Miss Ellis' plane since Sunday morning on a flight from Susanville to Alturas. Davis is a student pilot. Miss Ellis has had about 75 hours in the air.

En route from Reno to Alturas, the plane landed here early Sunday because of strong headwinds, and the flight to Alturas was resumed at 8:45 a. m. that day. Nothing has been heard from the two since.

Phil Hitchcock, of the Klamath civil air patrol, left today for Alturas and Susanville to join the search for the missing Alturas plane.

A plane was brought down from Bend for today's flight. Hitchcock said he planned to search further into Nevada than the previous search flights.

Antelope Tag Still Available
