

LEGION HEARS SERVICE MEN GET BACKING

CHICAGO, Sept. 20 (AP)—An educator and a top ranking industrialist told the American Legion today that men now in the armed forces should be given every consideration in the nation's post war plans.

The educator, F. L. Schlegle, president of the National Education association, asserted they should have a part in deciding whether a compulsory military training law should be enacted. Robert N. Gaylord, president of the National Association of Manufacturers, declared that industry's No. 1 job was to help the returning servicemen "become just as productive as possible," to find a spot for new skills, and to help the able and disabled regain old ones.

Schlegle set forth, in an address prepared for the closing session of the organization's 26th convention, that the educational policies commission was not opposed to such an undertaking but added:

"We feel that a decision in this matter is not an immediate necessity, since we now have such compulsory training imposed upon us and in operation as a result of enemy action."

"x x x When the war is over, it may be necessary to maintain a large standing army or provide the trained personnel from which one may be quickly constituted to police the peace. If we need either this actual or this potential power for the safety of the nation let us have it."

"We feel, however, that the need for it cannot be at present fully appraised. We feel also that it is a decision in which the men who are now on the fighting fronts should participate."

Gaylord, in his prepared speech, declared that "if business management fails this opportunity, (to help the returning servicemen) then government will grasp it and the creeping collectivism already planted in our land will no longer creep. It will stand erect and walk."

The Rockford, Ill., manufacturer said that he and many other industrialists were optimistic about the future because "business will be richer and wiser for all the changes, for in our returning veterans the nation regains its finest talent."

He said the task of providing employment to World War II veterans "belongs to top management."

Admiral Sees Navy Expansion

SEATTLE, Sept. 20 (AP)—Continued naval expansion until at least June 30, 1945, and a post-war navy "much larger" than the pre-war force, were predicted for the United States last night by Vice Admiral Randall Jacobs, chief of the navy bureau of personnel.

Navy discharges, he said, will be given on a point system similar to that proposed by the army. However, he added, "we won't be demobilizing until final victory anyway, so we can let the army pioneer the plan."

FDR SELECTS AMBASSADORS FOR 3 NATIONS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP)—President Roosevelt today nominated ambassadors to serve in three countries newly liberated from their Nazi invaders and in others on the threshold of freedom.

The president named Charles Sawyer, former democratic national committeeman of Ohio, to be ambassador to Belgium and minister to Luxembourg.

Stanley K. Hornbeck, of Colorado, now special assistant to the secretary of state, was nominated to be ambassador to the Netherlands.

In addition Mr. Roosevelt sent to the senate the nomination of Arthur Bliss Lane of New York to be ambassador to the Polish government-in-exile now in London, and named Richard C. Patterson of New York to be ambassador to Yugoslavia's London government-in-exile.

Lithgow Osborne of New York, now connected with the United Nations relief and rehabilitation administration, was nominated to be ambassador to the Norwegian government-in-exile in London.

The new ambassadorships cover all the conquered countries to which Anthony J. Drexel Biddle formerly served as the ambassador at large with the exception of Czechoslovakia. The White House said an envoy for that government probably would be nominated soon.

In the same list Mr. Roosevelt proposed Walter Thurston of Arizona to fill the ambassadorial vacancy in Bolivia created some months ago when Pierre de L. Boal returned to this country for a state department assignment. Thurston has been ambassador to El Salvador.

KLAMATH SHIPS 544 SPUD CARS

A total of 544 carloads of potatoes have already left the Klamath basin for market, it was reported today by State-Federal Inspector Ross Aubrey.

On two days this week, shipments totaled more than 50 carloads, and the average is now running well over 40 carloads daily, Aubrey reported. These are the heaviest early shipments in the history of the mushrooming potato industry here.

Heavy beginning shipments are necessary to an orderly disposal of the crop, which may exceed 12,500 carloads, it was pointed out.

SOLICITATION IN INDUSTRIES RUNS TWO DAYS

Industrial solicitations for the Klamath County Combined Community campaign will be concentrated in a two-day canvass on September 27 and 28 in most of the lumber mills and woods, according to Chairman Mitchell Tillotson of the committee in charge of this activity.

Supplies have already been delivered to many of the plants, and all others will be supplied well before the industrial canvass starts. In most cases, a joint solicitation by a representative of management and a union leader will be carried on. Union officials are helping plan all phases of the drive and are encouraging their members to support the campaign generously.

"Workers have supported each of the major agencies included in the combined campaign when they have carried on individual drives in the past," stated Vernon Chase of the International Woodworkers of America. "If they will stop to total up the amount donated to each of these agencies during a year they will probably realize that it adds up to a day's pay or more. Therefore we urge that they give at least a day's pay to this combined drive."

Hugh Haddock declared, "The lumber and sawmill workers are behind this drive and will do their part." Similar support has been shown by Earl Edsall, business agent of the Teamsters union.

Younger Voters' Election Interest Thrills Mrs. Dewey

10 Idaho Counties Back In Fold

LEWISTON, Idaho, Sept. 20 (AP)—The 10 panhandle counties of northern Idaho are once again a part of the state—to the satisfaction of the San Jose, Calif., chamber of commerce and south Idaho. Reaction of the involuntary secessionists, however, was doubtful.

Expressing surprise "that anybody in Idaho protested," Russell Pettit, manager of the San Jose chamber, wrote Gov. C. A. Bottolfsen yesterday that a second edition of a booklet on postwar Western America had returned the 10 counties to Idaho. The first edition amputated the area from the state and made it a part of Montana.

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BLOOD BANK TALKED BY LOCAL LEGION
