

# GOP CANDIDATE WILL APPEAR AT RAIL YARD

(Continued from Page One)

San Francisco at 11:11 a. m. PWT, today after a rousing reception by crowds in front of the republican 30,001 club.

The train, delayed beyond its scheduled starting time, was to make the first stop at Eugene, Ore. at 2:30 p. m., with a possible platform appearance of the republican nominee.

**Dewey Unruffled**  
Dewey, unruffled by two escapes yesterday from serious injury, reviewed a speech to be delivered in San Francisco tomorrow night outlining the republican program of "freedom and security for all."

Cheered lustily for his assertion here last night that there is no "indispensable man," the GOP presidential nominee promised to tell tomorrow's audience "the philosophy by which I believe we can achieve our two great goals for America, freedom and security for all."

**Cheering Crowd**  
Without referring to a train wreck which had delayed his arrival for several hours or to a narrow escape when the auto bringing him here swerved to avoid a truck, Dewey told a cheering crowd of about 7,000 persons in the ice coliseum here that in the making of "a people's peace" there could be no "indispensable man."

His campaign train was repaired overnight so that he could resume his journey south today.

A sympathetic throng rose to its feet stamping the wooden floor underneath and yelling itself hoarse last night when he declared:

**No More Pretense**  
"Let's have no more pretense about indispensable men. There are no indispensable men. If our republic after 150 years of self-government is dependent upon the endless continuance of one man in office, then the hopes which animated the men who fought for the declaration of independence and the constitution, have indeed come to nothing."

"The peace we seek," he declared, "must not hang by the slender thread of personal acquaintance of any two or three men. The pages of history are littered with treaties proclaiming permanent peace made privately by rulers of nations and quickly broken."

**Too Important**  
"This cause is too important to be trusted to discredited methods or to be dependent upon the life span and continued friendship of two or three individuals."

The New York governor's reference to the "two or three men" apparently was to President Roosevelt, Prime Minister Churchill of Great Britain, and Premier Stalin of Russia.

His allusion to the "life span" was in line with his previous assertions that the present democratic administration is "old and tired." President Roosevelt is 62, Dewey is 42.

**Big Applause**  
Greeted with a two-minute ovation, Dewey drew the biggest applause of his speech with this assertion:

"My opponent claims to be indispensable to peace and prosperity. In other words, he claims that the United States and the world cannot get along without him. He has chosen this as the issue of the campaign. I accept the issue and I challenge it."

The plain fact was, Dewey asserted, that 12 years of new deal administration "has given

hours. It merged solidly with parachute-dropped soldiers dropped near Nijmegen on the Waal Rhine. The British were apparently battling on to link with still other sky troops 10 miles farther north on the upper branch of the river near Arnhem.

The Siegfried line was being outflanked. The path was opening for a wheeling offensive across the flatlands of northern Germany. Nazis in southwestern Holland were menaced with encirclement.

American struck fierce German resistance in the invasion of Germany, and in their offensives from the Nancy-Metz line and toward the Belfort gap farther south. But two doughboy columns had thrust 20 miles or more beyond Nancy toward Strasbourg.

**In Boulogne**  
With the big supply port of Brest on Brittany peninsula in U. S. hands, Canadians battled into the channel port of Boulogne. An unconfirmed Alger broadcast said Boulogne's garrison already had surrendered.

The whole Netherlands front was developing into a potential vast new trap for the enemy. The lower Rhine defenses had been turned by the assault from the sky and the ground power-drive of the British. Allied warplanes battered at a German rush of reinforcements into The Netherlands and other points along the front.

With the British push underway, Field Marshal Sir Bernard L. Montgomery, in overall command of ground armies on the northern front, declared there was "no doubt" that war against Hitler would end this year.

The British drive enveloped Eindhoven, and stabbed on 45 miles farther north, joining men of the first allied airborne army at or near Nijmegen. They perhaps were already linked up with the pocket of allied soldiers at Arnhem.

German resistance tightened considerably. Heinrich Himmler was reported to have urged German units in Holland using "fifteen resistance." But the two allied armies were steadily enlarging their stand, blocking most of the roads to Rotterdam and Amsterdam. The Paris radio said even the Utrecht line of retreat had been cut by allied landings from planes.

**No Refund**

**Information Promised**  
How adjustments will be made to eliminate inequities and other details was discussed informally by Gage, who said that this information will be brought out in the press and at public meetings.

# JAP PRISON CAMPS MAY NOT BE BAD

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP)—The state department has reason to believe, Senator Wallgren (D-Wash.) was informed today, that conditions in Japanese prison camps outside the Philippines are not so bad as feared.

Replying to Wallgren's inquiry as to steps taken by the American government to aid prisoners in the camps, Secretary of State Hull quoted a statement from General Wainwright who said that conditions in his camp at Formosa were "as good as can be reasonably expected."

Neutral observers are not allowed to visit camps in the Philippines and information on conditions in camps there is deficient, Hull wrote, but reports on camps elsewhere in the Japanese-controlled territory "indicate that conditions are not as bad as we had feared they would be."

Since June 1, Hull said, the Japanese government agreed to permit prisoners in the Philippines to receive financial relief and the Swiss government has been instructed to furnish the maximum allowed, about \$10 a month.

A similar arrangement recently has been agreed to for American prisoners and civilian internees in the Dutch East Indies, Hull said.

Hull added the American Red Cross is attempting to forward small packets of concentrated vitamins and medicines.

# Dworshak Blasts Manpower Usage

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (AP)—Rep. Dworshak (R-Ia.) asserts that the federal government "has constantly added more civilians to the payroll and thus has not been cooperating in the best use of the nation's manpower."

Reports of the civil service commission show, he told the house yesterday, that the government had 3,323,302 civilians on its payroll July 31, or about 100,000 more than a year previous.

where we had important air bases which we have had to abandon.

**TURNING** back to the home front, Dewey levels his last night speech in Portland at the "indispensable man," with special emphasis on the point that peace made by indispensable men is unlikely to be permanent.

He told his audience: "The peace we seek must not hang by the slender thread of PERSONAL ACQUAINTANCE of any two or three men. The pages of history are littered with treaties proclaiming permanent peace made PRIVATELY by rulers of nations and QUICKLY BROKEN."

**THE** grandiose peace made by Napoleon and Alexander I of Russia, on a raft out in the middle of the river Niemen, for example. Less than half a dozen years afterward, these two indispensable men who made the peace between them were fighting each other tooth and nail.

**PEACE**, to be permanent, must have its roots firmly imbedded in the soil of the PEOPLE'S desires and convictions.

There is lasting peace between Canada and the United States—NOT because any set of indispensable men got together and made it, but because the people of the United States and Canada WANT peace, and REFUSE to tolerate even the idea of war with each other.

This peace doesn't depend on who is premier of Canada or President of the United States. NO LEADER in either country could break it. He would be tossed out instantly if he tried. U. S.-Canadian peace goes down to the grass roots.

# Finland Faces Tough Task Meeting Allied Peace Terms

pact requires that airfields in southern and southwestern Finland be placed temporarily at the disposal of the allies.

The loss of territory to Russia was the first point to the Finns and the first item mentioned by Von Born in his broadcast review.

Declaring that "September 19, 1944, will be one of the hardest days of our history," the acting prime minister announced that the armistice called for immediate restoration of the Russian-Finnish border fixed after the 104-day winter war of 1939-1940.

**Karelia Lost**  
"Thus Karelia is lost," said Von Born.

Karelia, the area northwest of Leningrad and west and north of Lake Ladoga, includes the city of Vilpuri and is the most industrially developed region of Finland. In that area lives more than 10 per cent of Finland's pre-1940 population.

**Outright Ceding**  
The agreement also provided for the outright ceding to Russia of the Petsamo area in the far north, with its port and rich nickel mines, and the leasing for 50 years of the Porkkala peninsula, with its naval base on the Finnish gulf, for use as a military region.

In cash, Finland must pay reparations totaling \$300,000,000 (American) within six years. Von Born disclosed this was only half what the Russians had asked in the futile peace negotiations last spring, but he added that "it is relatively heavier than any demand for reparations made on any country after the last great war."

**Pocket Remnants**  
In a communique last night at Pearl Harbor, Adm. Chester W. Nimitz announced that 81st division troops held two-thirds of Angaur, southernmost of the Palaus and have pocketed remnants of the small Japanese garrison.

On heavily-defended Peleliu Island, marine captors of the prized airfield were credited in official reports with controlling most of the east coast, but found the going rough against Japanese pillbox and trench positions in the center and on the west.

That covered developments through Monday, U. S. time (Tuesday at the invasion scene).

**Late Reports**  
(Today, Palau time, in a Blue network broadcast from Peleliu, John Cooper, representing the combined American networks said the leathernecks have seized all but the north tip of the island. He said the portion still in enemy hands did not represent too serious a problem and already naval shelling of Nipponese positions has been discontinued.

(Cooper reported the Japanese have not been able to get a single plane through the curtain of American aircraft ruling the skies over Peleliu.)

**Japs Concerned**  
Japan's concern over the danger to the Philippines presented by Morotal was suggested by MacArthur's report today of a third unsuccessful attempt of enemy planes to deal a sneak, night-shielded blow at that base.

MacArthur's announcement of all air activities included a 145-ton pounding of often-raided Dutch Celebes. Nimitz' communique told of strikes at Shumushu and Paramushiro in the Kuriles, including the strafing of an enemy destroyer, and a single plane raid on Iwo Jima in the Volcano islands, 750 miles south of Tokyo.

# Stork Has Tough Day At Zoo—Rhino Born

CHICAGO, Sept. 20 (AP)—The stork at the Brookfield zoo was a bit weary today. Births reported within the last 24 hours included a 45-pound baby rhinoceros, said by zoo officials to be the second rhino ever born in captivity; a baby zebra, a gazelle, and a kudu.

Director Robert Bean described the baby rhino, whose mother, Mary, weighs 3000 pounds, as the "most beautiful ugly baby in the world." He said the first baby born in captivity was at the zoo three years ago.

**Army Transport Long Overdue**  
ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Sept. 20 (AP)—An army transport plane with 16 passengers and three crew members aboard was overdue yesterday on a flight from Anchorage to Fairbanks; the army transport command announced.

The last radio report said the plane was flying at 9000 feet, by instrument, through rough air and icing conditions. No other details were given.

# Democrats Campaign For Soldier Vote

POPULAR BLUFF, Mo., Sept. 20 (AP)—Democrats are campaigning for their ticket in letters to soldiers from Chicago, it was confirmed today as an aftermath to such a letter being made public here.

The Chicago Times said that Mayor Edward J. Kelly said that more than 150,000 letters were sent out.

"We believe that the soldiers want to vote for Roosevelt and we're happy to assist them in obtaining applications for ballots," he was quoted as saying.

"It is a very strong appeal and may be unethical but not illegal," said Grover Dalton, Missouri republican chairman, said concerning the letter sent to him in St. Louis from here.

# REDS BREAK NAZI LINES IN ESTONIA

and Lithuania and pave the way for the remaining steps of the autumn offensive, expected to be bigger than anything to date. Developments may be expected from the Gulf of Finland to Yugoslavia.

The heaviest Russian attack in Latvia occurred southeast of Riga, with Gen. Ivan Bagramian's forces smashing forward 25 miles on a 75-mile front, sending the Germans reeling back into the Latvian capital. More than 2000 places fell in that area within four days.

The closest approach to Riga, officially disclosed, came with the capture of Kekava, on the west bank of the Daugava (Dvina) river six miles south of the city. A soviet communique said the Germans there had orders "not to retreat a single step" but they lost more than 3000 men. In five days on the whole front, the Germans have lost 570 tanks and 390 planes.

# United Air Lines Asks Another Trip

PORTLAND, Sept. 20 (AP)—Application for a fifth daily round trip along the coast has been made to the civil aeronautics board, United Air Lines announced today.

Effective October 1, the proposed extra trip would leave Portland at 5:33 p. m. and arrive at Los Angeles at 11:30 p. m. The northbound flight would leave Los Angeles at 8 a. m., arriving at Portland at 1:52 p. m.
