Boston was practically eliminated, New York was tottering on the brink and St. Louis was a faltering second to the league-leading Detroit Tigers today after the most important 24 hours of the American league season.

Steve O'Neill's Tigers, who had never been on top until Sunday, had opened up a game and a half gap on the Browns by knocking off the Yanks in the opener of a crucial series while St. Louis and Boston lost.

Detroit's 4-1 victory over New York's ace, Hank Borowy, took most of the wind out of the champs' sails and disappointed the Browns who had been counting on the Yanks to help pull the Tigers back toward the pack.

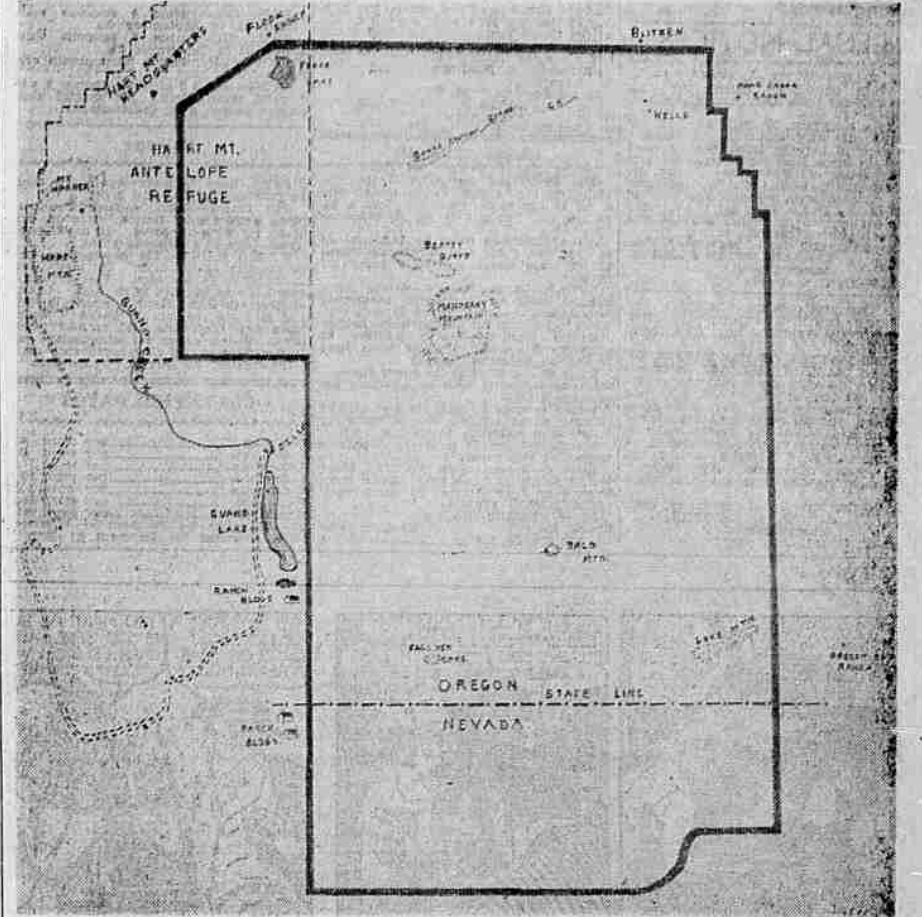
The Browns were shut out, 6-0, in 11 innings by the dungeoned Washingtons. Disaster struck Boston at Cleveland where the Red Sox bowled 8-2, to Steve Gromek's efficient nine-hit tossing.

Dizzy Trout was primed today to match Hal Newhouse's feat of beating the New Yorkers six times in the same season, the first time the champs had been so humiliated since the balmy days of Walter Johnson. Trout held five wins over the Yanks and Newhouse made it six yesterday by shutting out the McCarthy men until Johnny Lindell homered in the ninth. The young Mr. Left of the Tiger staff now has six straight victories, 26 for the year and has allowed only two runs in his last 38 innings.

World series fever began to hit the motor city with 28,290, the year's largest week-day turnout at Briggs stadium, watching the home club move three full games in front of the Yankees. St. Louis took a heart-breaking loss when Washington scored six on the 11th after blowing a chance in the last of the 10th when Denny Galehouse's single with the bases loaded hit base runner George McQuinn to retire the side.

Johnny Niggeling, veteran knuckle ball expert, who had rested since September 4, held Luke Sewell's men hitless for six frames and allowed only four blows before he bowed out for a pinch hitter in the 11th.

Map Shows Areas Closed to Antelope Hunting



This map shows naval gunnery range No. 2 east of Lakeview, and the Hart mountain antelope refuge, which are closed to antelope hunters who open the season Sunday, September 24. The gunnery area is used by naval gunners flying from the Klamath naval air station and its auxiliary facility at Lakeview, and entry is forbidden.

Antelope hunters who can find the gasoline will trek to Lake county areas next week-end for the opening of the season Sunday morning. Plenty of antelope tags are still available at the Portland office of the game commission, the fee being \$2.50 for residents. In making application for tags, a person should forward the correct fee and information as to the number and kind of hunting license held.

Areas closed to hunting include the Drake's flat area, the Hart mountain antelope refuge, and the navy's gunnery area No. 2 in the Hart mountain high desert country. Approximate boundaries of this area are: The north boundary lies just south of the Flook ranch and of the town of Blitzen; the east boundary follows along the foothills of the Steens mountains; the south boundary is the Oregon-Nevada state line; and the west boundary is just east of Guano lake and the Hart mountain antelope refuge.

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
