

PRIOR RATINGS PLANNED FOR CIVILIAN GOODS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22 (AP)—The war production board has taken steps designed to insure that industries making goods most important to the civilian economy are among the first to convert after Germany's fall.

Hiland G. Batcheller, operations vice chairman, has asked the WPB industry divisions to present by Saturday lists of those plants which should be cleared of war work as soon after V-Day as possible.

Batcheller's memorandum was not made public, but WPB officials explained it is intended to see that such companies are not tied up with war contracts and thus prevented from taking advantage of the sweeping removal of controls planned to come immediately on the end of the European war.

WPB will use the plant-by-plant lists in recommending to the war and navy departments where war contract cancellations should be made. The products for which lists are sought are:

Automobiles, telephones, typewriters, vacuum cleaners, washing machines, water heaters, street cars, air conditioning equipment, electric fans, electric ranges, buses, laundry machinery, office machinery, oil burners, light trucks, mining machinery, radios, railroad passenger cars, refrigerators, sewing machines, coal stokers, commercial cooking equipment and commercial refrigerators.

Emphasizing the importance of parts and components, since these are more apt to bottleneck civilian production than raw materials, Batcheller asked the divisions to make a careful check of firms supplying motors, gears and other parts to the industries named.

Meanwhile it was revealed that August production of munitions was 2 per cent higher than July's, but still 3 per cent behind schedule. The slight lag behind production objectives thus continued for its eighth month.

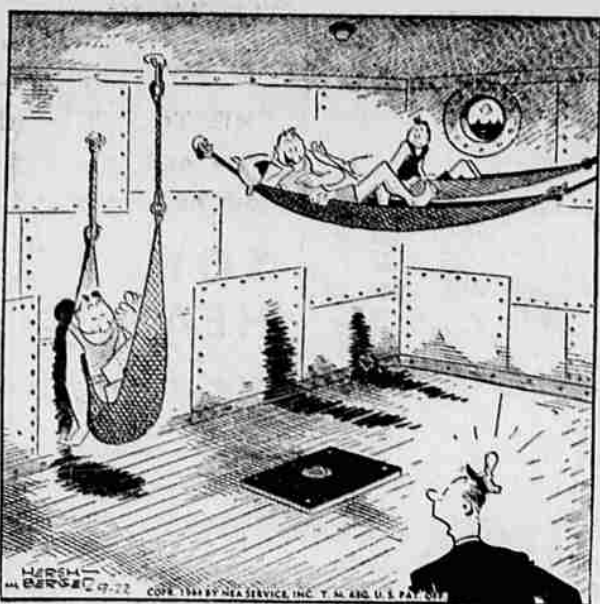

Caruso Dies Before Firing Squad; Shouts for Italy

ROME, Sept. 22 (AP)—Pietro Caruso, chief of police while the Germans occupied Rome, was executed today for turning over hostages to the nazis and for other acts of collaboration.

A firing squad at Fort Bravetta carried out the sentence imposed last night by an Italian court.

Caruso was sentenced to die in the first war criminal trial to be held in Italy. Specifically, the nazi collaborationist was condemned for delivering 50 hostages for execution in caves near Rome.

Caruso was strapped in a chair and shot to death in the back.

"Viva l'Italia," the doomed man cried just before a squad of metropolitan police fired. No coup de grace was necessary.

Caruso was convicted by an Italian court of rounding up 50 Italian hostages for execution by the Germans in the Arde-

tina cave near Rome. He also was accused of arresting Italian refugees in St. Paul's church, violating the Vatican's extraterritoriality. His young secretary, Roberto Occhetto, a co-defendant, got off with 30 years.

The trial was delayed Monday when an angry Italian mob lynched the chief state witness.

Caruso died in the bright sunlight this afternoon in the century old Fort Bravetta near the capital. The manner of his execution was the same meted to the Italians who were slaughtered in the cave, and was specified by the court, Prince Umberto, lieutenant general of the realm, denied clemency.

A priest administered extreme unction while the condemned man stared intently. As the robed figure drew back, Caruso shouted "Viva l'Italia!" and the firing squad acted. The body slumped over in the unpainted chair.

Immediately before the firing squad—picturesque in red and black uniforms—fired, an officer raised a saber and shouted: "Aim well!"

Returned Fighter Classified 1-A

TACOMA, Sept. 22 (AP)—Home three weeks after spending two years in the army, 14 months overseas, 18-year-old PFC John R. Strassburg has received a 1-A notice from his draft board. He enlisted when 16 but was honorably discharged when his mother saw his picture in a news reel of the Anzio beachhead and notified army authorities of his true age.

S. W. Staats, head of the Puget Sound draft board, said his case would be referred to higher authorities for possible dispensation.

MAJORITY OF NEWSPAPERS FAVOR DEWEY

NEW YORK, Sept. 22 (AP)—Editor and Publisher, Newspaper trade journal, said today that Gov. Thomas E. Dewey has the editorial support of 617 daily newspapers with a combined circulation of 21,439,768 out of 1067 which replied to a questionnaire sent to all of the daily newspapers in the nation.

Favoring reelection of President Roosevelt were 220 newspapers with a combined circulation of 4,676,510, the magazine said.

Newspapers backing Dewey for election, the magazine stated, represent 63.7 per cent of the total circulation for the nation's 1754 dailies which have a combined circulation of 44,392,829. Newspapers responding to the survey represent a total circulation of 33,862,430.

Figures drawn on the basis of replies by the 1067 newspapers, Editor and Publisher said, were as follows:

Favoring reelection of President Roosevelt: 220 newspapers or 20.6 of those replying, with a circulation of 4,676,510.

Favoring election of Dewey: 617 newspapers or 57.9 of those replying.

Undecided or neutral: 230 newspapers or 21.5 per cent of those replying, with a circulation of 7,546,152.

Comparing results with a similar survey made by the magazine in August, 1940, the magazine said "there has been little change in the political attitudes of the daily newspapers."

WALLACE PLUGS FOR ROOSEVELT

NEW YORK, Sept. 22 (AP)—Vice President Henry A. Wallace's first speech of the campaign today gave the nation a "liberal's" blueprint of the post-war future, predicated on the reelection of President Roosevelt as the man "who can better provide for permanent peace and full employment."

Speaking before 20,000 persons at Madison Square Garden last night, Wallace declared the campaign issue was not that of indispensability, but which of two men—Roosevelt or Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, the republican presidential nominee—could:

"1. Better cooperate with Churchill, Stalin and the gener-

alissimo, in writing a lasting, liberal, democratic peace which will best preserve American interests without being unfair to any nation, big or small?

"2. Best make sure that there are jobs for everybody and therefore good incomes for farmers, white collar workers, business and professional men?"

Asserting that Roosevelt has "the precious asset of long acquaintance" and "continuous, almost daily contact" with Churchill and Stalin, Wallace declared "even a reactionary will not
