## Ex-Service Dog Coming Home

Notified that the German shepherd dog his boy sent into training approximately two years ago has completed 18 months of active service and is ready for discharge, but warned that the animal has been trained to be aggressive, Phillips said he and his wife and 8-year-old Jack held some serious family conferences but decided to take the service star from the boy's bedroom window and to attempt to rehabilitate their veteran.

## Million and Half In Navy Overseas
