Wage Deal For V-Day Shaped By WLB

SEATTLE, Sept. 23 (AP)—Dr. George Bernard Noble, regional war labor board chairman, today announced the national board's stated policy that it would not consider a violation of wage stabilization regulations for employers who close their shops on V-Day to pay employees at straight time rates or earnings for hours not worked without obtaining war labor board approval. The board urged, however, that there be no closings or work stoppages which would interfere with the production effort necessary to carry the war against Japan to a finish in the shortest possible time.
