Engels of Mill Valley, California, board member of the national League of Women Voters, was introduced by the president and gave a comprehensive but brief talk on the origin and purpose of the league.

Mrs. Engels stressed two points, to increase the citizens' individual responsibility to government and to act as an organization in securing better legislation in the public interest. She reminded those present that the league's objective is to educate for intelligent participation in government and that the national program grows out of the combined thinking of all local leagues and action taken by them. League members were urged to share their knowledge of government, to know what they want in the way of better legislation and be willing to sacrifice for it.

BPW Club Hears Nutrition Program

In observance of nutrition month, designated nationally for September, the health and recreation committee, headed by Beulah Elliott, presented a program at the first meeting of the year for the Business and Professional Women's club on Monday evening at the Willard hotel.

Mrs. Elliott introduced six members of the club who gave short talks based on nutrition. Effie Garcelon, in discussing "How I Rate Myself as a Business Woman," stated that it is her belief most business women do not rate themselves highly enough, that they are inclined to take the narrow view and become lost in details. She urged that women, many of whom have advantageous backgrounds, learn to lead more and to acquire the over-all viewpoint, particularly in regard to the postwar problems now coming up.

Azita Kennedy, speaking as a Camp Fire executive, told of the fun and enjoyment in working with these girls and of the aims, work and projects of the Klamath groups. "What the girl does is not so important as what the girl is doing will do for her," stated Mrs. Kennedy.

Isabelle Brixner rated good health, a pleasant voice and a spirit of cooperation as just as necessary to all businesswomen as to teachers, and told of the need for encouragement of high school graduates to think of their higher education in terms of preparing to teach.

Emma Carter, Girl Scout executive, pointed out that professional Girl Scouting holds abundant opportunities, especially for those who like people, and urged more women to take an interest in this field. Mrs. Carter announced that during January a Girl Scout orientation course will be held in Portland at Reed college, when it is desired that several attend from here. Anyone interested is asked to contact Mrs. Carter.

Myrtle Caldwell listed the rating for a successful nurse as liking people, being able to serve them, to take orders and be trustworthy. She emphasized that a nurse must sacrifice her own work and own time to the welfare of the patient.

Winnifred Gillen, Klamath county home demonstration agent, asked "How Do You Rate," especially in regard to health and vitality as a result of proper nutrition. Mrs. Gillen said that breakfasts and lunches are being stressed by the county nutrition council, the former because it is slighted, and the latter because so many are carrying lunches.

In line with a new plan of having a short talk each meeting from some member on a timely subject, Bertha Geiger discussed the importance of voting, of studying national, state and city issues that will be coming up in the November election and of learning "to see behind the camouflage."

Madelon Adler, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. George H. Adler and a talented junior high student, presented the musical part of the evening's program with three piano numbers.

President Norma Miller introduced the new officers and committee chairmen, and reported on the district conference held in August at Dorchester House on the Oregon coast, at which a 25 per cent increase in membership was stressed.
