

Invite Veterans At VFW Party

An outstanding feature of Klamath Falls' hospitality to service men and women was the entertainment given in the high school auditorium Thursday evening by the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 1383 and the auxiliary for service men and women who have seen overseas service. The marines predominated, of course, those stationed at the Barracks are all veterans of foreign service.

Past Post Commander James Souther welcomed the guests, then introduced the state district commander, Pete Frederick. Beauty IS YOUR DUTY

UNSIGHTLY blackheads, oil and waste products of the skin accumulated in the form of hard little plugs or caps in the sebaceous or oil glands, should be removed because they impede the function of the all glands and tend to stretch the skin pores, aside from their very looks.

THE first, and most important step in removing blackheads is cleanliness. Wash your face and hands thoroughly with a mild soap and warm water. Make sure you have a good heavy lather and use either a rough, heavy washcloth or a complexion brush. After scrubbing, rinse your face first in warm water several times so that every trace of soap is removed. Then pat cold water over your face a few times.

WHERE the blackheads are more firmly entrenched, a second step is necessary following the scrubbing. While your face is still flushed and the circulation has been stirred up through the vigorous scrubbing, put a heavy layer of lubricating cream over the area where blackheads are noticeable. Allow it to remain on a couple of minutes in order to soften the skin surface. Then remove the excess cream with tissue. Next, with tissue-covered fingers, press the skin where the blackheads are. Be gentle and do not bruise your skin. Complete the treatment by patting the skin with a mild skin freshener or astringer.

FOR extremely stubborn cases, still further attention may be needed. After scrubbing the face steam it with a hot towel or by holding your face over a basin of steaming water for about five minutes. Then follow the same procedure.
