Dixie Walker Wins League Batting Race

NEW YORK, Sept. 26 (AP)—Dixie Walker of Brooklyn, had the National League batting championship in the big today after a season-long struggle with Stan Musial of the Cardinals. The Dodger outfielder had a 19-point edge with six games to go. The American league was still a dog fight with Boss Lou Boudreau of Cleveland the newest challenger to Bob Johnson of the Red Sox.

Even if Walker failed to hit the rest of the season his final average would be around .340 or two points higher than the St. Louis Cardinal defending champion has now. Dixie upped his mark three points during the week, ending yesterday, to hit a .393 figure for the season. Musial was hitting .344.

Scandinavian Runners Will Race in U. S.

STOCKHOLM, Sept. 26 (AP)—Gunder Haegg and Arne Andersson, Swedish runners who between them hold virtually all the world's middle distance records, and Hurdler Haukan Lidman, have accepted invitations from the U. S. treasury department for a series of races in America.

The tour, arranged to aid in the sale of war bonds, will start late next month and continue until early December.

Because the runners want at least two weeks of conditioning on the other side of the ocean, they are expected to leave by plane soon for the United States. Lidman, who speaks English well, will serve as interpreter and manager. Andersson, a high school teacher, also speaks English, while Haegg toured the United States in the summer of 1943.

The hurdler probably least known to the U. S. sports fans, has been clocked in 1:43 for the 110-meter hurdles.

Prior to today's acceptance, both Haegg and Andersson had expressed their doubts concerning their ability to turn in good efforts in indoor board tracks.

Haegg could not be reached today for comment while Andersson's wife said that the runner who ran the mile in 4:11.8 on July 12 this year was "out digging potatoes."

Fine Hurling To Highlight World Series

NEW YORK, Sept. 26 (AP)—The world series between the St. Louis Cardinals and either the Detroit Tigers or the St. Louis Browns should be one of the best pitched since the days of Christy Mathewson, Chief Bender and Jack Boombas four decades ago.

The Tigers, should they win the American league flag, will present Hurricane Harry Newhouser and Paul (Dizzy) Trout, two of the best pitchers in baseball. The Browns have an exceptionally strong hurling corps in Jack Kramer, Bob Mumfrie, Nelson Potter and Denny Galehouse while the Cardinals boast of Mort Cooper, Max Lanier, Leo Wilks and Harry Brecheen.

Newhouser and Trout, between them, have registered 53 of the Tigers' 84 victories to date. The left-handed Newhouser's record is 27 wins and nine defeats, including five shutouts and 23 complete games, while Trout boasts a 26-12 record, including six shutouts and 31 complete games. Newhouser also is the leading strikeout hurler in the Majors with 171.

Angels Win Cup Series From Bevos

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 26 (AP)—The Los Angeles Angels won the Pacific Coast League baseball playoffs opening at Seal stadium in the northern city tomorrow night.

The Angels, winners of the regular 1944 Coast league pennant, beat Portland 3 to 2 with a ninth-inning run last night, bagging their series 4 games to 2.

The San Francisco Seals previously reached the finals by defeating Oakland 4 games to 1.

Play for the \$5000 grand prize will continue at San Francisco Tuesday and Friday evenings, after which the clubs will travel here for Sunday action.

West Coast Off to Good Grid Start

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 26 (AP)—Pacific coast football, holding its own in the college ranks among those maintaining wartime schedules and augmented by more service teams this year than last, is off to a flying start for the 1944 season.

Experienced talent in all college strongholds is scarcer, necessarily, due to military calls, and 17-year-olds dot the lineups of schools which have no navy or marine training commitments.

Competition, however, in the various classifications such as all-civilian schools against each other and college-military trainee teams opposing similar rivals already appears closer than it did a year ago.

German Prisoners Refuse to Exercise

High School Gridders Say Ground Too Hard—Boches Marched Back to Camp

PEABODY, Kans., Sept. 26 (AP)—High school football players here complained that their gridiron was suffering from undue hardening of the ground, so German prisoners of war won't exercise there any more.

The climax came Sunday. The prisoners showed up for their exercising; so did a group of high school students who protested the ground was becoming so hard it was unsafe for football.

Some remarks were exchanged, said Lt. Col. Loyd H. Shafer, commanding officer of the base prisoner of war camp at Fort Riley, of which this is a branch. But he added that no blows were exchanged, and that the Germans were marched back to camp—and wouldn't march to the football field again.

Several of the high school boys were carrying rifles, the colonel said in his report yesterday, but he explained that was a coincidence: They had just returned from a hunting trip.

Last week Colonel Shafer ordered that transportation of prisoners between their barracks and the farms in this vicinity where they are helping with farm work should no longer be handled by farm women driving family automobiles.

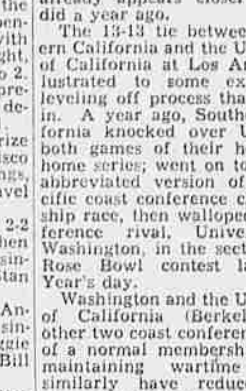

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Ducks Charged \$1 a Day Summer Lake

PORTLAND, Sept. 26 (AP)—Ducks for a price—will be charged to shoot migratory ducks on Summer Lake this season. The state game commission announced today.

Participants will be charged \$1 a day by the commission, which has acquired property which formerly was under federal control.

Duck and geese season extends from October 14 to January 1. Bag limit for ducks is one of any species, with additional bag of five all species.

For geese, the daily limit is four of snow or white-tailed and two of other species. Only one day's limit may be held on a time.
