Sari has a chipped kneecap and his doctor advised him against attempting to play this year. This was bad news for the Pelicans as Sari was one of the mainstays of the forward wall. Harold Wirth will play the guard slot in Sari's absence and proved himself to be a capable performer in Friday's contest.

The Pelicans worked out Tuesday afternoon in preparation for their tilt with the Salem Vikings this Friday night at the capitol city and seemed to be showing some improvement.

Their line plays were clicking against the second string and the boys were hanging onto the ball.

The only change in the Klamath lineup to date is at right end where Chuck Thurman has replaced Tom Bessonet. Thurman is a little speedier than Bessonet and may be able to take care of the right flank a bit better for that reason.

The Pelicans should score for the first time this season in the forthcoming battle. The boys have the plays and the stuff and if they can once get functioning smoothly should stand an even chance of tipping the Salem outfit over. The team learned a lot last Friday night and by using this hard earned knowledge to the best advantage will let the Vikings know they've been in a full game.

The Salem eleven is not to be taken lightly. Coach Tom Drynan has a good ball team and the boys showed they had what it takes by coming from behind twice to defeat Lincoln high last Friday. Another thing to be considered is that the Vikings will be gunning for the Pelicans after the drubbing they absorbed last year at the hands of the Klamath horde.

Salem also uses a straight T formation and Cook may drill his pupils in the use of the single wing upon occasion. It will be recalled that Grant pulled that stunt of shifting into a single wing with an unbalanced line with considerable success.

In all events, we're behind the Pelicans to a man and will be pulling for them all the way Friday night.

Sig Jakucki could be the key to the American league pennant race today for the footloose ex-soldier who was a June sparkler, but an August washout for the Browns, had earned a most important victory that sent St. Louis back into a first place tie with Detroit.

With five games to go for the co-leaders and the New York Yankees who hummed along with fingers crossed three games back, Luke Sewell had his pitching staff straightened out with five trusted starters. Detroit again had to fall back solely on Hal Newhouse who goes today, and Dizzy Trout, who probably will go tomorrow, and so on. Stubby Overmire's sore arm had complicated Steve O'Neill's problems.

Jakucki's feat, sensational enough on its own merits for it was a brilliant five-hit shutout over Boston, 1-0, gained added stature for the rookie had not started in 16 days and hadn't won since August 21. Three earlier victories over Boston prompted Skipper Sewell to call on him last night and he brought home the bacon.

Coming on top of Nelson Potter's blanking of the Red Sox it lifts the St. Louis record to seven straight victories in which the hurlers allowed a total of only 11 runs. It was the Red Sox' 10th straight defeat.

After the Browns finish with Boston today, the schedule calls for four "toughies" with the Yanks while Detroit entertains last-place Washington. Despite this, St. Louis has started selling world series tickets on the strength of their super-duper pitching down the stretch.

Trout has his 27th win and the Tiger pair are within one of tying the "modern" record of 55 set by Jim Bagby Sr., and Stan Coveleskie of Cleveland in 1920. "Modern" meaning since the advent of the lively ball.

The Tigers avenged their defeat at the hands of Philadelphia by a 6-0 triumph yesterday with the help of homers by Dick Wakefield and Rudy York.

New York still has hopes, though remote and vanishing fast, after topping Chicago, 9-5. Johnny Lindell's three-run single and his sensational diving catch to stop a Sox rally kept those hopes alive.

"Grandpa Joe" Heving set a new American league record for relief men by appearing in his 62nd game, but Cleveland lost to Washington, 8-3.

The St. Louis Cardinals recovered their batting eyes and banged out 14 to beat Brooklyn, 8-7. Cincinnati took two from New York, 8-5 and 6-4. Pittsburgh drubbed Boston, 6-2, and Chicago shut out the Phillies, 15-0, in the opener but bowed, 10-1, in the second of a two-night double.

Flip of Coin Decides Site If Tie Ensues

CHICAGO, Sept. 27 (P)—If the St. Louis Browns and the Detroit Tigers end the American league season in a tie for the pennant, the title will be decided in a playoff game in Detroit, Monday, October 2.

The arrangement was made today in the office of the league president, Will Harridge.

The game site was determined by the flip of a coin. Don Barnes, president of the Browns, called "heads" over the telephone from St. Louis, but it landed tails up. Jack Zeller, Tigers' general manager had agreed to let Barnes call it.

Harridge announced that, if the playoff game is necessary, gross receipts would be divided between the St. Louis and Detroit clubs after the league's share is deducted.

If the race should finish in a three-way tie, with the New York Yankees sharing the top berth, playoff games will be conducted in Detroit and St. Louis.

This was the first occasion in the circuit's history that such plans were drafted. The coin was tossed by Charles Dunkley, Associated Press sports editor at Chicago.
