Salem Team Loaded for Pelicans

Vikings Boost 8 Returning Lettermen For Battle With Klamath Eleven Friday Eve

SALEM—(Special)—When the Klamath Falls Pelicans trade tackles with Coach Tom Drynan's Salem high Viking eleven on Sweetland field here Friday night, they'll be up against a T-formation-happy bunch of gridsters boasting eight lettermen from last year's Vik touchdown troop and a starting lineup which averages 177 pounds per man.

Surviving their first two contests, one an 18-6 victory over Milwaukie and the other a 20-18 win over Portland's Lincoln high, minus injuries of any serious nature, the capital city preppers will take the field Friday in tip-top shape, barring possible injuries during practice this week.

Leading the Red-and-Black's attack will be a couple of swivel-headed swiftness, Ev Staats and Art Gottfried, both members of the '43 varsity.

Left Halfback Staats is rated a triple-threat and is particularly dangerous in a broken field. Opposite Lincoln last Friday, the 155-pounder intercepted a Cardinal pass on the Salem 17 and zig-zagged his way no less than 83 yards to pay dirt.

An excellent blocker as well as ball carrier, Gottfried, 156-pound right halfback, has proven himself capable of busting the opponent's line wide open in the Viks' two previous outings and will no doubt be out to do just that to the Pelicans' forward wall Friday. Gottfried also displayed his broken-field running ability to Portland grid fans last week, returning a Lincoln kickoff 72 yards through the entire opposing defense.

Rounding out the Salem backfield is Fullback Bob Weber, a transfer from Tigard, and Eugene (Jeep) Lowe, a converted center. The former was a 101.1 sprinter on the Viking track squad last spring. Each tips the scales at 178.

The line averaging 185 pounds per unit, finds Jim and Bill Barlow, brothers, at the end posts. Veteran Bill is the team's chief pass-snagger, Jim a constant defensive threat.

Letterman Mel Hilficker, a 220-pounder, and Jack Slater, at 180, are the tackles. A pair of 188-pounders, Niles Castor and Don Wilson, hold down the guard slots. Tom Boardman, 191, patrols the pivot post, his second year at the job.

It is a lack of seasoned reserves that forms the major worry-material for Drynan, an ex-Oregon State grid star who took over the reins of the Vikings in 1942, moving up from a coaching position at this city's Parrish junior high school. An eager but inexperienced staff of substitutes backs up the starting eleven, but to date have been inserted into games only two or three at a time, never as a complete eleven.

The Salemites literally lay havoc with the "T", using it as a basis for a healthy portion of their kaleidoscope of formations. The backs sometimes line up in an orthodox "T", bunch up in one solid clot or spread out over an area of several yards—but all basically resemble the "T". A single wingback is also used by the Norsemen.

At this writing, it looks as though the stands will be packed to the rafters for the Vik-Pelicans Friday. Over 1300 tickets have been distributed to Salem high students up until early this week, and the pasteboards were last glared at the ticket-booth. Since Sweetland's field's stands accommodate but 1500 fans, temporary bleachers will be set up for Friday night's tilt.

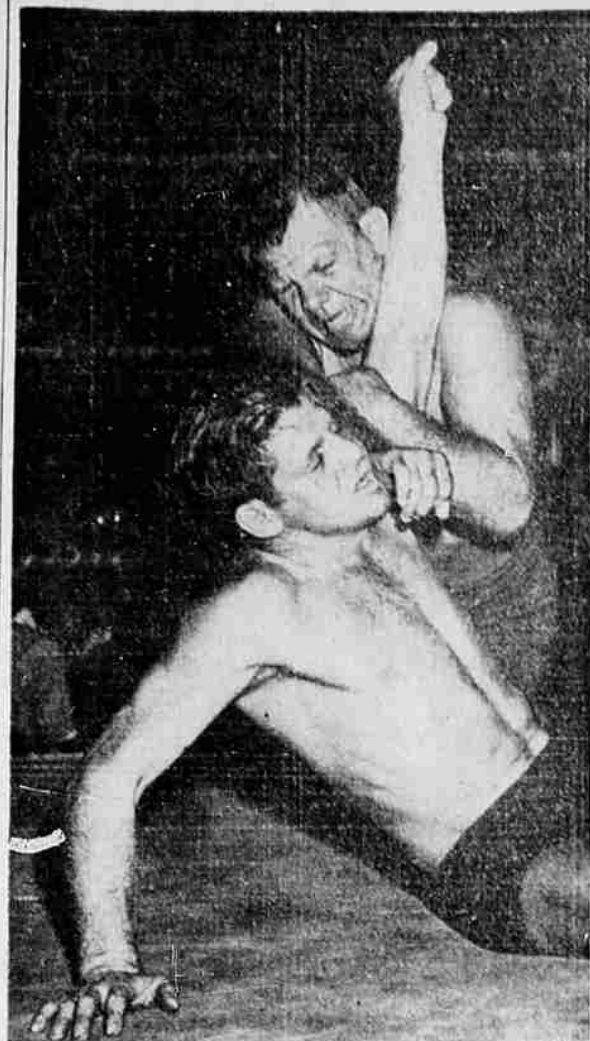

Washington's maligned Senators, picked to win the pennant in March but destined to be a gloomy last in October, held the key today to Detroit's first pennant bid since 1940.

Granted the Bengals may find the last four steps the steepest after beating the Nats 15 times in their first 18 meetings, but the two opposition candidates, St. Louis, one game back, and New York, three lengths off the pace, will be clashing in a dog-eat-dog series that can easily eliminate both.

With four games to go all around, Detroit's one-game lead looks good because the schedule is breaking in their favor after a long uphill struggle. Steve O'Neill's overworked duo of Hal Newhouse and Dizzy Trout are not down for duty today but either of both will be on call.

As long as the Tigers get pitching and hitting like yesterday's 4-0 victory over Philadelphia, nobody can get close. When the Yanks and Browns chased one another from April to mid-September, everything seemed to hinge on their closing clash but the Brownies' loss to Boston last night took some of the edge off.

Rain in St. Louis almost turned things upside down yesterday but the Browns, after moving the start for an hour waiting for the drizzle to stop, finally played and were sorry. It was the end of a 7-game St. Louis winning streak and a 10-game Boston losing string.

Pinky Woods, a surprise nominee, took the decision, 4-1, his fourth of the year, but gave way to Red Barrett after a wild spell in the eighth. Denny Galehouse was lifted for a pinchhitter in the fifth trailing, 1-0, and his relief pitchers failed as the Browns muffed repeated opportunities in the late innings.

It was Newhouse with win No. 28 for the Tigers in the shutout of the A's, boosting the Newhouse-Trout total to 55 victories, tying the old mark held by Cleveland's Jim Bagby Sr. and Stancoveleskie.

New York kept its foot in the door and breathed life into its whisper of chance by trimming Chicago, 7-2. Cleveland showed

Marines Ready for Navycats

Leathernecks Hold Final Scrimmage Today; Reserve Seat Tickets On Sale Now

The Marine Barracks gridiron squad is staging its last practice scrimmage this afternoon in preparation for the opening game against the visiting Navycats from Willamette university Saturday.

Coach Clyde C. Roberts has not announced a definite starting lineup, as competition for the various positions has been so keen that it has been virtually impossible to select the top candidates for each post.

Starting probables in the backfield against Willamette, named by Coach Roberts, include Capt. Roy Walters, former Furman university flank, at blocking back; IIA 1/4 c Merlin Morehouse, the squad's only sailor and the youngest man on the team, 19 years old, a wingback; PFC Frank Bancro, a smooth-shifty tailback with semipro experience, and 235-pound Cpl. William Salvadori at fullback.

In the forward wall, the wing situation will be cared for by TSgt. James Darnell, a rangy 6' 3" defensive genius, and PFC C. J. Zablosky, a deceptive passer. The squad's place kicker, Cpl. Oscar Chapin, will be around for his share of the end duties.

Capt. Robert Byrne, 180-pound former grid star at John Carroll university, reputed to be the hardest tackler in the line, is expected to start at guard, along with PFC J. D. O'Connor.

PFC Walter Apt, three-year man at Iowa U. Sgt. Maurice Rothberg, PFC Steve Thompson and PFC Hosea Fowler will be standing by to take over the guard slots.

Three men are vying for the pivot position, Sgt. Sam English, ex-Illinois U gridders, Sgt. Harry Golden and PFC Jack Walsh. At present, Golden is expected to get the nod to start at center.

With the last scrimmage today, the Leathernecks are slated for skill practice, with last minute looks at Willamette's system tomorrow.

Except for the loss of PFC Joe Fiore, out for the season with a shoulder injury, the Leatherneck eleven will take the field Saturday practically intact. A few minor injuries and sore spots are still bothering various men, but not seriously enough to prevent anyone from playing.

Reserve seats are on sale at the chamber of commerce for \$1.50 for everyone other than high school students and service men, who will get seats on the east side of the gridiron for 50 cents.

The kickoff is slated for 2 p. m.

Whitman College Football Hopes Receive Bad Jolt

WALLA WALLA, Sept. 28 (P)—Hopes of the Whitman college football team making a good showing against the University of Washington at Seattle Saturday took a jolt yesterday with the announcement by Coach Ben Dobbs that John Lewis, one of the two first-string tackles had broken a collarbone in a scrimmage and would be out the rest of the season.

Lewis, 210 pounds but only 18 years old, was a typical 1944 member in that he had no previous gridiron experience, high school or otherwise but he was fast and aggressive and learning the game rapidly. His home is Coulee City.

To fill the void Dick Turk, regular center, will probably be moved to tackle, leaving Ben Weeks as sole pivotman. Another change in the starting lineup puts Vaughan Phelps, halfback from Laurel, Mont. In the lineup in place of Les Moyer. Phelps looked good while Whitman was being shellacked last week by second air force 78 to 0.
