Revenues received by each county from O. & C. lands in lieu of taxes may be used for roads, schools, or for any other purpose for which county funds may be spent.

County revenue from this source has risen steadily year by year since 1938, when the O. & C. lands were placed under sustained yield management by the general land office. Timber cutting on these lands proceeds at a rate of approximately 500 million board feet annually, which is their estimated capacity to grow new timber to replace the old timber as fast as it is used up. Under this plan of management the O. & C. lands provide a perr anent source of income and therefore they are a part of the county tax base which is insured against being lost.


