### Landlords Asked to Give Two Types of Data to OPA

(Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of articles explaining the OPA rent control system established in Klamath County.)

When registration of rented dwellings gets under way sometime next week—notice will be given when the date is set—landlords will be asked to supply the office of price administration with two types of information, both "musts" in establishing the rent ceiling.

The first of these, discussed in the Herald and News yesterday, is the rate actually charged

on the date used as the basis for the rent ceiling.

But the rate charged does not tell the whole story.

A house rented for \$30 a month on the freeze date, for example, may have included heat, refrigeration or other services. To arrive at a correct picture of that property's rent, and to guarantee that the rent now charged presents the same value as it did then, a second type of information is asked for at registration time.

Information Asked

Landlords are asked to state whether the dwellings were furnished, whether there was running water, a flush toilet, a

bathroom, central heating, a heating stove, mechanical refrigeration, electricity, a cooking stove and other equipment.

Similarly under the heading of "services" they are asked for a yes-or-no answer as to whether the following were provided: garage, heat or heating fuel, cooking, fuel, cold water, hot water, light, ice or refrigeration, janitor service, garbage disposal, painting and decorating, interior and exterior repairs and any other services peculiar to the property.

If at first glance the two groups of questions may seem to overlap, you will, on examining them closely, come to distinguish between hot water service, electricity installed and lighting furnished.

It is decidedly to the landlord's advantage to answer these questions as fully as he possibly can,

particularly in the case of dwellings first rented since October 1, 1943. In such cases, since the OPA rent director has authority to adjust such rates to the level prevailing in the community for comparable accommodations, a true picture of what the rent includes may make some difference in that adjustment.

Workers in rent control offices in established OPA defense-rental areas frequently comment that the problem of making adjustments, after the program is under way, is made easier when a full statement of such data is given on the registration form.

#### Should Be Complete

The process of adjustment—to be discussed later in this series—is sometimes lengthy to the point of being annoying as the necessary examination of the case goes on. It functions at its best and for the greatest convenience of landlord, tenant and

rent director when the registration is complete on all points.

Guarantee against an incorrect record of such services and equipment is the fact that a copy of the registration, after being checked at the rent office, is given to the tenant. With that copy tenant—a reasonably sure of what they are supposed to be getting and may expect in the future.

#### Specialized Problem

The problem of hotel and rooming house registration is so specialized that it might be out of place to take it up in detail through the newspaper columns. For the general public and the tenants of such establishments, however, two points are worth mentioning.

1.—The ceiling price on these places is the highest rent for each term—daily, weekly or monthly—for each number of occupants charged during the

30-day period between September 1 and October 1, 1943, with certain modifications in cases of rooms whose rental history differs from those dates.

2.—The tenant in such dwellings does not receive a copy of the registration. Rates approved by OPA, however, must be posted in each room.

The rental regulation applies also to cabin camps and trailer areas.
