1050 KLAMATH MEN GET FALL BALLOTS

Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell Jr., thanked county clerks and their printers Thursday for their "complete cooperation" in sending general election ballots to the 42,000 service men and women who applied for ballots at his office.

Klamath county clerk, Mae K. Short, and her staff had soldiered ballots out to 1050 Klamath service men by Monday, in spite of the delay caused by the last-minute filing of independent candidates for president and vice president, Claude A. Watson and Andrew Johnson. They were assisted by Dorothy Post and Eva Dixon, who are employed at the city hall.

"They are to be commended for the extraordinary work and effort they gave to this job, for without their full cooperation, it could not have been accomplished," Farrell said. He stated that all who have requested ballots will be given a chance to vote.

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FROM SHIPPLY, STUFFY DISTRESS OF
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Mammoth Projectile Slated As Third Vengeance Weapon

SOMEWHERE IN FRANCE, Sept. 23 (Delayed) (AP)—A 14-ton projectile with an explosive radius of three kilometers—almost two miles—is scheduled as the third in Hitler's series of vengeance weapons, it was learned today.

V-1 is the robot bomb launched from a platform. V-2 is the long range rocket fired from a carrier plane, for which the Germans are reported using the Heinkel 111.

V-3, so far as is known here, has not yet been used against either England or the attacking allied armies.

(This dispatch, written last Saturday and only today cleared through allied censorship, did not expand upon the explosive radius of V-3. However, the implication was that its power to wreck or damage buildings extended almost two miles from the point of impact.)

Information on the "V-3," the successor to Hitler's flying bomb

and long range rocket, was obtained by American third army troops in their drive into Germany.

This information disclosed the projectile is just short of 60 feet in length, is five feet five inches in diameter and weighs 14 tons at the take-off. Propelled by a mixture of liquid air and alcohol, it is shot into the air vertically, then is controlled by radio.

No other details were disclosed, but it was believed the Germans have not yet placed the V-3 into operation.

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
