Medical Officer Awarded Bronze Star

FORT LEWIS, Sept. 29 (AP)—Maj. Harold J. Barker, 34, of Lorain, Ohio, who was medical officer in an infantry division's camp on Kokorana island in the southwest Pacific, was presented the bronze star for his service on the island at a ceremony here this week.

While under bombing his patients were cared for in large foxholes camouflaged with palm trees. The citation said that the division's malaria disability was the lowest in the south Pacific as the result of Major Barker's efforts and that he was able to return 80 per cent of the men to combat duty after bouts with malaria.

Search for Holdup Men Abandoned

CANYON CITY, Sept. 29 (AP)—Search for bandits who robbed the Prairie City bank September 20 has been dropped in this mountainous region by state police and sheriff's officers.

Wyatt refused to join Biggs and Robinson in a jailbreak after they had been arrested on car theft charges, Judge Lytle was told.
