## Today's Roundup

ON this day of the commissioning of the Klamath Falls Marine Barracks, it is well for the people of the community to take stock of their part in the Marine Barracks program.

One of the major reasons the installation was located here was because Klamath Falls was regarded as a good liberty town. There may be difference of opinion as to what represents a good liberty town, but at any rate it is our job to make this as good a town for the marine veterans of the Pacific as we can.

Organized programs are not enough. There must be a great deal of personal interest on the part of the people of the community, and those who have undertaken this sort of thing have been well repaid in pleasant relationships with the marines. The Barracks administration has been most active and helpful in promoting the proper community relationship with the marine corps.

## Letters

THIS newspaper has received a number of letters from marines at the Marine Barracks complaining about various features of the Barracks program. These letters were unsigned, and evidently were written in collaboration.

In composite, the complaints were against the "chow," taxi fares, hiking, military drills, the type of work required such as chopping wood, shoveling dirt, building bridge paths, and fire fighting. There were several expressions to the effect that the boys felt they are not being treated as convalescents.

We understand from what has been stated publicly about the medical program at the Barracks that drill and moderate work are a part of that program, and are designed to maintain the best possible physical condition on the part of the men in order to help throw off the tropical maladies.

It is possible an extension of vocational training for marines, along the lines of the fine start made at the high school shops, would be valuable in giving additional constructive work to the lads at the Barracks.

At any rate, we would say to the boys who wrote us that our personal impression, from an objective sideline vantage point, has been that the whole Barracks program represents a sincere effort on the part of their government, their Marine Corps, and the post administration,

## Stabilization Essential To OPA Rental Controls

(Editor's Note: This is the fourth in a series of articles in connection with the establishment of OPA rent control here effective October 1.)

Stabilization is the essence of the office of price administration's rent control program: stabilization of the price exacted by the landlord and paid by the tenant, and stabilization of housing itself in emergency war centers.

Hence the OPA's provisions regulating evictions. Evictions are governed by local law, to be sure, but the rent regulations modify local procedure to protect the tenant from those evictions that are contrary to the purposes of rent control.

So long as the tenant continues to pay his rent, he cannot be put out of his home by eviction or exclusion. That is the general principle.

Exceptions Noted. But there are exceptions. A landlord may serve notice to vacate if:

1. The tenant fails to pay his rent.
2. The tenant refuses to renew a lease.
3. The tenant refuses the landlord access to the premises for purposes of inspection or showing the place to a prospective buyer or mortgagor or other interested party.
4. The tenant violates a substantial obligation of tenancy or commits a nuisance or uses the dwelling for immoral or illegal purposes.

**Demolition Factor**  
5. The landlord intends to demolish the dwelling or to make such alterations as cannot be made with any person or persons in occupancy.

6. The landlord wishes to occupy the dwelling himself. In this latter case, a landlord evicting a tenant for his own occupancy cannot legally rent that dwelling again within six months. Furthermore, the regulation applies to the owner's actual occupancy, not that of a married son or daughter or any other member of his family.

State and local law in general govern the time a landlord must give his tenant to pack up and move, but in such cases as outlined above the OPA asks a minimum of three-days notice.

**Notice Needed**  
Where a dwelling is sold to a buyer who intends to live there himself, OPA says that notice of eviction must be filed with the rent office and becomes effective three months after filing. However, this applies only in case the buyer has made a down

payment of at least 20 per cent of the purchase price, all or part of which down payment may have been borrowed on security other than the property in question.

The provisions of this regulation restricting evictions do not apply to a subtenant, where the removal is sought by the original landlord.

Nor does the eviction regulation apply in the case of the landlord who rents rooms in his own private home to not more than two individuals or one family unit. In such cases, a landlord may demand possession of his rooms at any time.

Permit must be given by the rent office to evict on any other grounds. In all cases, however, a careful landlord, anxious to comply with rent control regulations, should consult with the rent office as to the eviction procedure required of him.

And in all cases, a copy of the landlord's notice to his tenant must be filed with the OPA within 24 hours after it is given the tenant.

## The War Today

HITLER'S V-3, as described from France, is just another rocket, and the only new thing about it are its huge size and its substitution of alcohol for gasoline fuel, and even the latter is not altogether new.

Sixty feet long, five feet in diameter is the description. Divided by three, it sounds like a meteorological rocket which Dr. Robert Goddard was firing in New Mexico years before 1939. His was a long cylindrical tube, an air torpedo in looks.

German rocket experimenters before the war were using various fuels, including powder, liquid oxygen and gasoline.

The V-3 is said to use liquid air, which is probably not an important change, as the purpose of either liquid air or of liquid oxygen is to get enough oxygen to keep the explosive jet burning to drive the projectile.

## Short on Gas?

SUBSTITUTION of alcohol for gasoline could be a confession of acute oil shortage. Alcohol certainly would make a fine rocket fuel, but gasoline contains more heat energy, volume for volume and weight for weight.

The engine which drove the buzz-bombs to London evidently has been abandoned for the V-3. The buzz-bomb draws its oxygen from the air outside. That would not be possible for V-3 described. The buzz-bomb flies low. V-3 is said to start almost straight up, like a long-range artillery shell.

The expected altitude of a V-3 trajectory would carry it to a point where it could not efficiently suck oxygen from the air. Hence it seems to be designed as a true rocket, which carries its oxygen in its fuel.

The French reports gave no idea of the amount of explosive in V-3. Take-off weight is 14 tons. Much of this may be fuel, but how much would depend on the range.

## Explosive Radius

THE only information about the weapon's power is that it has "an explosive radius of three kilometers," or almost two miles.

But the words explosive radius do not necessarily mean very wide destructive power. The absorbing power of air is tremendous. At a distance the air waves are able to do considerable damage to structures which happen to be situated just right, but the lethal power is long gone.

If the V-3 is a short range weapon, 50 miles or less, the radio control is easy to understand. If it is long range, the efficiency of radio control is not so easy. A huge rocket of this type would travel much faster than any airplane, although maybe the unknown but highly touted speeds of German rocket planes might be a help in keeping track of one.

## Summer Constellations Linger in Western Sky

The changes in star positions and the early "dews and damps" of evening surely tell us that in the "ever rolling year" autumn is again with us.

Yet in our October we find lingering in the west some of our summer constellations for a while still available for study.

Do not fail to see the gorgeous planet Venus in the twilight south of west. Tonight it outshines everything excepting the big round harvest moon in the east. For the remainder of our study let us observe between 8 and 9 p. m.

Somewhat north of due west and still well above the horizon we find glittering orange Arcturus, the brightest star of the "bear driver." At some distance above and slightly to the left of this splendid star, note the small half circle of twinkling points outlining the northern crown.

In very clear skies not too flooded with moonlight seven little stars are discernible in this charming figure. One, considerably outshining her sisters, is known as the pearl of the crown.

**Mythical Origins**  
According to one Greek myth this is the crown presented by Athenian Theseus to Ariadne, daughter of the king of Crete, after her scheming had saved Theseus from the terrible monster in the labyrinthine cave to which her father attempted to sacrifice him. Another classical story names Bacchus as the donor of the crown after Theseus had deserted Ariadne.

But surely a more pleasing legend is that of the American Shawnee Indians. To them the stars of this charming sky-group were the Celestial Sisters. One day White Hawk, a mighty hunter, when in search of game suddenly emerged from the woods upon an extensive prairie. He was greatly amazed when he came upon a large circular path beaten in the grass but with no trail leading from the outside. As he stood wondering at the unusual sight, suddenly there came slowly floating down from the blue heavens a silver basket carrying several beautiful maidens.

When the basket came to a stop on the ground, the maidens leaped lightly out and began dancing around the circular beaten path, one keeping time on a ball of silver.

**Back to Sky**  
White Hawk hurried toward them, but the Celestial Sisters ran swiftly to their basket and were soon on their way back to the azure skies where tonight they shine in the half circle of stars known to us as the northern crown.

Leaving this jeweled crown, we point out the remaining bright stars of evening, Capella is flashing colors low in the north-northeast, very high in
