Willamette Navycats Romp Over Marine Eleven 33-14 In High Scoring Contest

On a perfect football Saturday afternoon at Modoc field the Willamette Navycats ran over and around the Leathernecks from the Marine Barracks to the tune of 33 to 14, to complete an exchange of upsets, and at least in one case an exchange of fumbles, between Klamath Falls and Salem over the weekend.

The initial upset was staged at Salem Friday night where the favored Vikings were knocked off their undefeated perch by the Klamath Pelicans and the other occurred here when the Navycats toppled the highly touted Marine Barracks eleven before an estimated crowd of 4000 fans.

In all due respect to the Willamette boys, who played a swell game of football, one must still give plenty of credit to the Leathernecks that participated in the fray has been hospitalized at one time or another and they actually just weren't in shape. They displayed plenty of power at times but were sluggish and repeatedly outcharged by the lighter but more aggressive Cats.

McClure and LaPaglia were outstanding in the marine backfield and Higgins did good work in the line. Simmons, Willamette fullback, was the standout player of the day along with Mary Goodman, pass snagger left end for the Cats.

Everything that could happen, did happen, and it was a thrilling ball game from start to finish. In fact, Hunt Clark, veteran referee, stated that he had seldom, if ever, officiated in a game where so many unusual situations developed. One was the automatic safety scored by the marines when a kick was blocked and the ball went into the end zone and then bounced back for a Leatherneck fell on it for what appeared to be a touchdown but was only a safety. Another was the exchange of fumbles between the two elements that finally resulted in an even 100 yard touchdown gallop by Wardrop, center for the Navycats.

Chapin kicked off for the marines to McElver who brought it up to the 31. Simmons battered through for 12 yards and a first down. After 3 plays had failed, Conway kicked to McClure on the goal line who returned 15 yards. LaPaglia gained 6 as the half ended.

Simmons kicked off to Bancer, who was hurt on the play, and McClure came back in the ball game. The marines were stopped and McClure kicked to his own 45. Augst picked up a yard and took the ball again on a lateral for 8 more. Simmons then swept around his own left end to travel 36 yards for a touchdown. Rowe's kick was good.

Goodman took the ball on an end around for 17 yards and a first down. Simmons made 5 and Augst was inches short. Simmons picked up 8 yards and another first down on the Leatherneck 11. Waldorf lost 4 on a double reverse and Simmons was stopped cold for the first time. Irish Run Wild Over Pitt 58-0

NEW YORK, Oct. 2 (AP)—Notre Dame has played only one football game this season but already its new grid coach, Ed McKeever, had qualified for the "crying towel" championship.

McKeever, who succeeded Frank Leahy when the latter entered the navy, said several weeks ago the Irish, the No. 1 team in 1943, would "lose a lot of games" this fall. On that basis he looked like a close game when the South Benders tackled Pitt Saturday. Instead, the Irish ran wild by 58-0 and now seems destined to retain their national title.

Equally as surprising as the Notre Dame margin of victory was the defeat of Navy, the team many expected to replace the Irish as the top eleven. The midshipmen lost to North Carolina preflight, 21 to 14, being unable to stop Otto Graham, former All-American at Northwestern, now with the Preflighters.

George Munger's University of Pennsylvania team also came up with a surprise 18 to 7 victory over Duke's Southern Conference champions while Indiana ended Michigan's two-game winning streak, 20-0, and California upset UCLA, 6-0.

In other outstanding games Alabama and LSU deadlocked at 27-27; Ohio State thumped Missouri, 54-0; Sande Field Malloped Rice, 59-0; Tennessee beat Kentucky, 26-13; Illinois tied Great Lakes, 26-26; Yale beat the Coast Guard Academy, 7-3; Wisconsin took Northwestern, 7-6; Army whacked North Carolina, 46-0; the Texas Aggies beat Texas Tech and the Norman Navy Zoomers tripped Oklahoma. Holy Cross tied Dartmouth and Mississippi trounced Florida.

Browns Beat Yanks 5-2; Tigers Lose to Nats 4-1

First Pennant for St. Louis Club In Tightest Race in League History

America's third wartime baseball season ended yesterday with the St. Louis Browns winning their first pennant in the tightest race in American league history, a race not decided until the last out on the last day.

A 5-2 victory over the New York Yankees coupled with a Detroit defeat by Washington 4-1, gave the flag to the Browns by one game, breaking a tie that had existed since Friday.

With all due credit to the Tigers for their amazing climb from seventh place on July 13, most fans were pulling for the Browns, not only because the Sewellmen had never won a pennant but also because of their thrilling comeback after they had apparently dropped out of the running. Just three weeks ago, they had skidded to third place after having led virtually all season.

With Sigmund (Jack) Jakucki hurling a six-hitter before 37,815 fans, the largest St. Louis crowd of the season, the Browns swept a four-game series from the Yankees, to climax a great stretch driving, during which they won 11 out of 12.

Although long distance slugger won the final game from the former world champions—two homers by Chet Laabs and the other by Vern Stephens accounted for all the Browns' runs—pitching was the Browns' chief weapon all season. Nelson Potter, Jack Kramer, Denny Galehouse, Bob Muerter and Jakucki hurled 10 complete games of the last 12, including four shutouts, and did not give up more than four runs in any of the last 11 games.

Potter, winner of his last six straight, won 19 games, more than any other Brownie hurler since Bobo Newsom's 20 victories in 1938. Kramer, of one-hit fame, won 17 while yesterday's clincher was Jakucki's 13th. Most of the batting punch was produced by Stephens who drove in 105 runs and hit 20 homers. Emil (Dutch) Leonard, 34-year-old knuckleballer, who had not beaten the Tigers since September 15, 1941, losing seven straight to the Bengals since, was the Tiger tamer, hurling a four-hitter before a dazed crowd of 45,565 fans. Stan Spence, whose hitting beat Detroit on Friday to create a first place tie, cracked his third homer in three days to put the crusher on Detroit.

Dizzy Trout, who teamed with Hal Newhouser to set a new lively ball era record with 56 victories, made his second attempt in three days for his 28th

ice, a month before the close of the season. They finished with a .300 average in fourth place 11 games off the pace. They ended the season splitting a twin-bill from the White Sox, winning the first 3-1 and then losing 4-1.

The second division clubs were Cleveland and Philadelphia tied for fourth, Chicago and Washington eighth. The Mackoons won both games from the Browns, making their best finish since they placed fifth in 1934. The A's were responsible for the Yankee downfall, sweeping a crucial three-game set in mid-September to knock the Yankees out of first place.

For the Senators, it marked their first last-place finish since he took charge in 1932. A strong favorite to capture their first flag since 1923, the Nats never were in the running but blasted Detroit's hopes by winning two of the last four games from the Tigers, although Detroit won 17 out of 22 from them.

The Cards made a runaway race of it winning their eighth flag and third in succession by a 144 game margin. They became the first club in National league history to win over 100 games for three successive years. They ended the season splitting a twin-bill with the Giants, losing 6-5 in 13 innings and winning the second 10-3.

Pittsburgh nosed out Cincinnati for the runner-up spot, as the final day, splitting a twin-bill with Philadelphia winning the opener 9-1 and losing the nightcap 7-1, while the Red bowled to Brooklyn 6-5. Cincinnati finished third 143 games behind.

Wardrop Runs Length of Field

Willamette won the toss and elected to receive with the Leathernecks choosing to defend the north goal. Darnell kicked off to Anderson who returned to his own 28. After two plays, Conway quick kicked to Bancer on his 49 and the marine left half brought it back to the Cat 45. Salvadori ploughed through center for 3 and Bancer went around his own left end for 14 yards and a first down. On the next play, Salvadori fumbled and the Cats recovered on their own 19. Two plays netted 4 yards and Simmons then took a punt around his own left flank for 23 yards and a first down. Rochon fumbled on the next play and Darnell recovered for the marines. Willamette held and Bancer booted to Rochon, who let the ball pop out of his arms. Golden, marine center, snaggled it on the fly and carried it to the 2 before he was brought down. Bancer was stopped for no gain but on the next play he was actually on the goal line and had only to fall forward when again the ball popped up and Wardrop grabbed it in the air and mandered 100 yards behind some fine blocking to score the first touchdown of the game. Rowe's kick split the uprights. SCORE: WILLAMETTE 7, MARINES 0.

Packers Tame Lions 26-7 In Pro Tilt

CHICAGO, Oct. 2 (AP)—It looked today like those Green Bay Packers, who once dominated the National Football league, are at it again.

At any rate, the Packers, who last week knocked off the defending champion Chicago Bears, are far ahead of the rest of the pack in both the eastern and western divisions, and if they get past the already-beaten Pittsburgh Steeler-Chicago Cardinal combination next Sunday, they certainly can't be overlooked by the yegs who make a habit of crystal-gazing for a champion.

The Packers won their third straight league game yesterday when, after spotting Detroit a touchdown, they got their best yardage midway of the second quarter and passed their way to a 27-6 victory before 18,500 fans. It was an overhead attack all the way that brought them the victory, with Irv Comp and Lou Brock doing the tossing and Don Hutson, Paul Duhart and Comp receiving in the end zone. The fourth touchdown was scored by Ted Fritsch after a flurry of passes put the ball on the six-yard line.

The Packer victory came in the only league game of the day, although six other teams were busy in intra-league exhibitions.

The Chicago Bears, apparently rejuvenated after losing to Green Bay, 42-28, a week earlier, came back to hand the Washington Redskins, last year's eastern division champs, a 28-0 lacing before 22,017, the day's biggest crowd. Washington had won earlier exhibition from the Bears, 21-7, in Baltimore.

At Pittsburgh, the Card-Pitt combination edged out a 17-10 victory over the New York Giants when Fullback Johnny Griego put on a one-man half last play to score two touchdowns. Cleveland's Rams and the Philadelphia Eagles played a 7-7 tie at Buffalo in another exhibition.

The Rams and Eagles each are undefeated in league competition. The Eagles defeated Boston, 28-7, last Tuesday night to lead the eastern division. The Rams beat the Card-Pitt club, 30-28, September 24.

Next Sunday, the whole league swings into the "chips down" schedule, with New York at Boston, Brooklyn at Detroit, Chicago at Cleveland and Washington at Philadelphia, in addition to the Card-Pitt game at Green Bay.
