

CHEMUL CAR CRASH UNDER INVESTIGATION

Klamath officials today began investigation of the fatal accident at Chemul Saturday in which Nicholas Demetarakos, Klamath Union high school student, was killed.

The district attorney's office reported that a juvenile petition may be filed to give juvenile court jurisdiction over determination of the case as it affects Charles Perry, high school student, driver of the car. An inquest will probably not be held.

District Attorney L. Orth Sismore said he personally went over the scene of the accident, and that indications point to excessive speed at the time the car left the highway south of Chemul, went into a barrow pit, and struck two trees.

Demetarakos was in the front seat and died shortly after the crash. Perry, Bill Berry, and Jack Anker, all high school students, were injured, and George Bell, another student escaped unhurt. The injured boys were released from Klamath Valley hospital today.

It was explained today that the boys went on their own to Salem to see the game between Klamath high school and Salem Friday night. They did not go under sponsorship of the high school and did not travel with the football team. The accident occurred on the return trip.

In the accident report filed for young Perry, it was stated that the boys stopped at Chemul and got a bag of doughnuts. Demetarakos got into the front seat last, but the door on his side did not entirely close. A short distance out of Chemul, the car was stopped and the door was slammed shut.

It was shortly after resuming the trip that one of the boys in the rear seat reached into the front seat for doughnuts. The movement distracted Perry's attention momentarily, and the car struck a soft shoulder, according to the report.

Stanley Woodruff, principal of KUIS, said Monday that officials were making it possible for all students to attend young Demetarakos' funeral.

Honorary pallbearers have been chosen from the senior members of the "K" club to which Demetarakos was eligible for membership.

Services will be held from Sacred Heart church with Whitlock's in charge, the time to be announced later.

Oregon Future U. S. Linen Center, Asserts Pfefferkorn

CORVALLIS, Oct. 2 (AP)—Oregon should be the future center of an American linen industry, a Czechoslovakian linen manufacturer said today.

In a booklet published by Oregon State college, Richard Pfefferkorn said that linen weaving would be more economical in this flax-growing area than anywhere else in the nation.

Pfefferkorn, who made a several-year study of this region under the AAA, recommended improvements in grading and processing of Oregon flax to assure better calibre fiber.

victors begin to look forward to and plan for the future the military situation becomes complicated by the POLITICAL situation.

History tells us that this political side of war is the soil in which the seeds of peace or STILL MORE WAR will sprout.

The time is here when this political news that marches side by side with the military news is acutely interesting to us.

SECRETARY HULL today gives us a brief and far from satisfactory glimpse of this political side of the European war.

It seems, according to scanty disclosures he made at his news conference this morning, that an ALLIED (presumably British-American) military mission was EJECTED from Bulgaria by a RUSSIAN commander. Hull says pacifically that he thinks the Russian commander had not been "properly" advised.

The mission, he adds, went into Bulgaria to handle ANGLO-AMERICAN interests.

He "thinks" the matter has been straightened out (as a result of "arrangements" made by Washington and London with Moscow) and "expects" that the mission will be allowed to re-enter Bulgaria.

NOBODY will tell us what it is all about, so we have to guess.

The best present guess is that after the war Russia aims to control EVERYTHING in Europe east of a line drawn through about the center of present-day Poland. We and the British seem to be handling Italy, but over and over we appear to have been told by the Russians to keep our hands off of everything east of the Adriatic.

The Russians (one guesses) suspected that this Bulgarian "mission" was another attempt by us and the British to get our fingers into what they regard as THEIR PIE.

UNTIL the Germans are jacked, there will be no open trouble between us-and-the-British and the Russians. We need their help and they need ours to finish off Hitler. Any political clashes that may be in the offing will be kept under cover (except for minor incidents, quickly hushed up, such as this Bulgarian mission) until after Germany surrenders.

THERE may be NO trouble coming up after the war with Russia. WE (meaning the common run of American citizens) certainly want none. There is no sound reason why the United States and Russia should clash over any territorial situation that can at present be foreseen.

But little incidents such as this Bulgarian mission (in which we seem to have been associated WITH THE BRITISH in some venture which the Russians regard with suspicion) keep coming up frequently enough to worry us common, ordinary Americans, who want only to get the European war over and done with and AREN'T interested in Europe's political-territorial messes except as they threaten to breed future wars that we'll be drawn into.

IN all these matters, we would be inclined to trust Secretary Hull if we felt that he had a FREE HAND, but we have the uneasy feeling that he has no freer hand in the over-all foreign picture than Nelson has had in the War Production Board.

If he gets off the beam (by talking too much) Secretary Hull is just as likely to be sent to China as Nelson or Wallace.

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2-MILE STEEL WEDGE DRIVEN NEAR AACHEN

at points as far as 54 miles north of Aachen.

American cavalry attacked at Havert, Germany, 10 miles northwest of Gellenkirchen and 20 miles north of Aachen, while American armor, fighting on the right of the British second army in Holland, advanced toward the Meuse at Overloon, 54 miles north of Aachen.

Swift Attacks

Surging into the rubble of German defenses almost before the debris had stopped flying from one of the greatest aerial and land bombardments, the Americans were reported pouring through a lane of ruin pointed at the Rhine between Cologne and Dusseldorf, side door to the Ruhr and main highway to Berlin.

"I doubt if they will stop now until they have reached the Rhine," said one front line correspondent.

Hodges, ending a stalemate of almost two weeks, led off the assault with a tremendous massed artillery barrage in which 10-inch guns thundered salvoes into the enemy's fixed positions, and an hour-long aerial attack by hundreds of medium and fighter bombers.

Many of the enemy positions were shattered, and the defenders were others were pinned helplessly in their concrete posts.

Eastern Advance

Soviet progress toward the Morava valley route of the Belgrade-Greece railway was the only important advance claimed today along the entire eastern front.

Aerial observation and information from Yugoslav partisans pinpointed the location of German reinforcements diverted to the Serbian invasion sector. Stornovich, augmenting their usual role of flying anti-tank guns, were sent out along with relays of light bombers in paralyzing assaults against these troop movements.

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Yanks Beat Back Attacks in Italy

ROME, Oct. 2 (AP)—Americans of the fifth army yesterday beat back German counterattacks on Monte Battaglia, lofty dominating height on the road to Imola, for the fourth straight day and captured neighboring Monte Cappella after a bitter battle, the allied command announced today.

The skies over most of the Italian front cleared after nearly a week of frequent rains, enabling the Mediterranean allied air force to take an active role supporting the doughboys.

troops had penetrated 22 miles into southeastern Hungary in an offensive aimed at Budapest, Magyar capital less than 100 miles distant. Russian gains in that sector were officially acknowledged by Hungary but their depth was not disclosed.

(Moscow was silent about the Hungarian drive and about the situation at Warsaw, which was described as "critical" by Polish patriots as Berlin said the nazis were overwhelming the dwindling guerrillas.)

Bombers Aid New Aachen Offense

LONDON, Oct. 2 (AP)—More than 2700 allied warplanes struck in close and deep support today of the great new American offensive against the Siegfried line in the Aachen sector of northwest Germany.

Over 1000 medium and fighter bombers blazed a path into the nazi wall immediately before Lt. Gen. Courtney H. Hodges' men.

About 900 Flying Fortresses with 500 escorts tore at targets around Cologne and Kassel while 300 Liberators poured bombs loads into Germany's greatest freight yards at Hamm, 90 miles northeast of Aachen.

Allied Mission Ejected From Bulgaria, Report

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (AP)—Secretary of State Hull said today that ejection of an allied military mission from Bulgaria by a Russian commander had required a little attention but that he thought the matter now was straightened out.

The mission went into Bulgaria to handle Anglo-American interests, and some authorities here said the Russian military commander had not been properly advised.

Discussing the incident at his news conference, Hull said he expected the mission would be permitted to re-enter, the defeated nazi satellite as a result of arrangements made by Washington and London with Moscow.

The allied armistice terms for Bulgaria would be ready in due course and that, meanwhile, he could not help but notice the lack of speed with which Bulgaria is pulling out of Greece and Yugoslavia.

Hull, 73 years old today, observed the anniversary by working as usual.

Johnston Against Lifting Ceiling

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (AP)—Eric A. Johnston, president of the U. S. chamber of commerce, said today in a statement prepared for the war labor board that he favors high wages but opposes lifting existing wage ceilings because, he argued, that might lead to inflation and then to deflation.

"After the last war we had inflation followed by deflation," he said. "We must avoid that mistake this time."
