

# CHURCHES TO SHIP CLOTHES TO EUROPE

Churches of Klamath Falls today inaugurated a collection of clothing to be shipped through the United Nations relief program to the people of liberated countries of Europe.

Infants clothing of all types, especially knit goods, men's and boys' suits and other garments, women's serviceable dresses, blankets, sheets and quilts are needed.

No shoes, straw hats or party dresses are wanted.

The clothing should be in good, serviceable condition. Cotton clothing should be washed but not necessarily ironed.

Clothing for this cause should be left at the churches before October 14. The Methodist church is the clearing-house for the program, and if convenient, the clothing should be left there.

People who find it inconvenient to take the garments to that church may leave them at their own church or the church nearest their home.

## Evans Urges Price Control Continuance

PORTLAND, Oct. 3 (AP)—Price control must not vanish with the war, unless the nation wants a tremendous post-war inflation, a new district OPA price executive declared today.

Hosca R. Evans urged that price controls be continued until production catches up with purchasing power. "Experience of the last war," he said, "showed that the greatest inflationary period occurred six months after the armistice."

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# OPA to Adjust Rents After Registration of Dwellings

(Editor's Note: This is the fifth of a series of eight articles on rent control in the Klamath area.)

When registration of all rented dwelling units—single rooms, houses, apartments, cabins—is completed, the office of price administration (rea rent office) will be prepared to administer the other features of the program.

Unless Klamath Falls is an exception to the usual experience of OPA, the subsequent work of the rent office will deal with petitions for adjustment in rent, petitions for eviction and tenant complaints.

This series of articles would not be complete without a discussion of the bases on which OPA is allowed to adjust rates. The subject, however, is complex and highly specialized. At best, only the high spots can be touched. This article and tomorrow's will be devoted to touching those high spots.

**Need Authorization**

The first thing for a landlord to remember is that no increase in rent should be charged without a written order from the rent office authorizing that increase. Regardless of whether you may qualify under one of the provisions for increase, the order must be issued by OPA first.

The second general statement is this: Such adjustments are made only after the landlord enters a petition for adjustment, and then only after a careful study of the case is made.

Third, the adjustment when granted is effective as of the date of the order and is not retroactive.

**Check on Inflation**

Fourth, except as noted later in the article, all increases are made on the basis of rents prevailing in the area on the freeze date, for comparable dwellings, since the freeze date is the line OPA is pledged to hold against inflation.

Here are the grounds on which OPA is allowed to grant an increase in rent:

1. A major capital improvement since the freeze date. Here OPA distinguishes between a capital improvement and mere repair, replacement or maintenance.
2. A major capital improvement before the freeze date, where the rent was held fixed by a lease or similar agreement.
3. A substantial increase in services, furniture, furnishings or equipment since the date at which the ceiling was established.
4. A special relationship between landlord and tenant, such as blood ties, which kept the rent at the freeze date substantially lower than comparable rentals.
5. A lease in force on the freeze date, for a term that began on or before October 1, 1942, for a rent substantially below the level of comparable dwellings.
6. A situation whereby the rent on the date determining the rent ceiling was set by a lease providing for a substantially higher rent at other periods during the term of the lease.
7. Where the rent on the date determining the ceiling was substantially lower than at other times because of seasonal demand. In both such cases, the rent office may provide for different rent ceilings for different periods.
8. Where there was some peculiar circumstance at the date fixing the rent ceiling which prevented normal bargaining between landlord and tenant.

There are additional grounds for adjustment. They will follow in tomorrow's article.

# LONG EUROPEAN WAR PREDICTED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3 (AP)—Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore.) found nothing in the British system of government which should be adopted here, he said last night on his return from Europe, but he summed up his opinion of the war in one sentence.

It will last "a damn sight longer" than many people over here realize.

The Oregonian, one of a dozen congressmen who visited England and France in the past few weeks, returned yesterday with Reps. Walt Horan (R-Wash.) and Holfield (D-Calif.). The others will return this week.

Regarding the British government, Ellsworth told a reporter, "While I would consider it a 'popular' government, the background of legislation, the means by which 'popular' results are obtained is so different from our own legislative process that I felt a study at first hand would be beneficial."

**NAMES RELEASED**

WALLA WALLA, Oct. 3 (AP)—Names of five of six men killed in the crash of a B-24 Liberator bomber Saturday near Wenatchee were made public yesterday by Col. David Wade, commander of the Walla Walla army air base. None was from the Pacific northwest.

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# LANDLORDS IN BASIN TO SIGN UP THURSDAY

Landlords in Chiloquin, Malin and Merrill areas will have office of price administration rent registration brought to them Thursday, Marvin Hixon, examiner in charge of the Klamath Falls rent office, reminded them today.

Hixon will be at the city hall in Chiloquin from 9 to 11 a. m. Thursday, swinging from noon to 3 p. m., to take care of registrations in that area.

Malin landlords will register at the Malin city hall, from 3:30 to 5:30, Hixon said.

"Of course, any householders from these three communities who happen to be in Klamath Falls before Thursday, are welcome to register at the war price and rationing board here," Hixon said. "But we don't want them to have to make a special trip here for the purpose."

# BOMBERS FAIL TO RETURN FROM RAID

**ALEUTIAN HEADQUARTERS**, 11th Army Air Base, Alaska, Oct. 3 (AP)—Pilots and crews of two Mitchell bombers failed to return after the September 9 raid on shipping off Paramushiro, the 11th air force announced yesterday.

One of the planes, piloted by 2nd Lt. Albert Dandy Scott of Weleetka, Okla., flew so low it struck the mast of the vessel it was attacking.

Scott and his crew were believed sighted in a rubber raft after the plane crashed into the sea and may possibly have been picked up by a Japanese boat.
