...Gellenkirchen. It is two miles inside Germany. The 11th Army also drove the Germans from the moated, 12th century castle of Rimberg after a long battle in that border town. Nearby Palenberg in Germany also was captured. Tanks and artillery supported the first army's shove in this border, and German resistance was heavy.

**Carves Wedge**  
The Berlin radio said the Germans had carved out a wedge 11 miles wide and nine miles deep in German defenses. The new advances followed as of two miles in depth and a six-mile sector yesterday in the opening of the assault that spanned the Wurm river.

The Germans tried a "little lightning" stand at Geggendorf, 15 miles beyond Ubach. Whitehead said, and U. S. artillery fired 800 shells into the town for 30 minutes.

**Three Counterblows**  
Supreme headquarters said the Germans launched three counterattacks yesterday at Hurligen, 13 miles southeast of Aachen, but were repulsed. Farther south, the Americans cleared the roads at Echtenach, reich front town 11 miles northwest of Aachen.

The U. S. third army assaulted the fortress in the Metz chain, captured Malzeres Les Metz, the Moselle's west bank seven miles above Metz.

The truth of our misunderstanding is a matter of conjecture, and we feel sure that press and public will respect us being our own affair."

There is no dominating principle that holds the New Deal together at this time. The reason is TOO MUCH POWER retained TOO LONG. Too much power retained too long corrupts men's minds. History is quite plain on that point.

The fourth term campaign (to be based upon the solid, politically-frozen South, which CAN'T vote for a Republican; upon the three million federal office holders (Bricker, in a speech last night, said it is a New Deal axiom that every individual added to the federal payroll is equivalent to FOUR additional votes for the New Deal) and upon the type of selfish PERSONAL interest that says in answer to every campaign argument: "Yes, but FDR is OUR MAN and we've got to stick with him because in a pinch, he'll take it away from somebody else and give it to US.") Without these considerations, the fourth term would be utterly impossible.

# CITY NEARLY DESTROYED IN 63-DAY FIGHT

...pletely destroyed" before the Polish "insurrection collapsed." A terse, communique from Gen. Tadeusz (Bor) Komorowski, said: "Warsaw has fallen." **Fighting Ended**  
This confirmed earlier reports from both Berlin and Moscow that fighting inside the capital had ended. Russian forces are in Prague, the industrial suburb of Warsaw, separated from the main city by the broad and swift Vistula river. Earlier, Polish sources in London insisted that only a "mercy truce" had been ordered to remove civilians from the city of 1,265,000. **Supplies Exhausted**  
Komorowski's communique said: "Warsaw has fallen after exhausting all supplies of food and ammunition on the 63rd day of fighting in the face of overwhelming enemy superiority. On October 2 at 8 p. m., orders were given to cease fire." The battle inside Warsaw began when the patriots could hear Russian guns thundering on the approaches of the city in late July. The red army summer offensive then was at its height. The communique was the last word from Komorowski. Polish officials here admitted they did not know the fate of the general, on whose head both the Germans and the soviet-supported Polish national liberation committee have placed a price. While organized resistance by the little underground army was ended, Polish headquarters here said scattered fighting against the nazis continued and this was substantiated by the German radio. It first announced the battle had ceased, then reported firing had broken out again.

# LEAVE POLICY SETTLED BY SCHOOL BOARD

Leave of absence policy, established by the joint boards of education, again came before the group at a regular meeting Monday night. Since the beginning of the war, it has been the policy of the board to grant leaves only to members of the staff called into active service either by voluntary enlistment or through selective service. Continuation of the policy was voted unanimously by the boards. This pertains only to men and women entering service, however.
