Klamath Falls men and women who are not now employed in essential war industry are wanted for ship repair work at the Bremerton navy yards, according to Ernest Parmentier, manpower recruiting officer for the yards, who will conduct a labor recruiting campaign here Wednesday and Thursday, October 4 and 5.

Persons interested in a position in the navy yard may contact Parmentier at the U. S. employment office here during business hours Wednesday and Thursday, Jack Ahmeyer, head of the local office, announced today.

Men from 18 up and women from 20 to 25 will be considered regardless of experience, Parmentier said, although experienced shipfitters, sheet metal workers, electricians, pipe-fitters, welders and machinists are chiefly needed.
