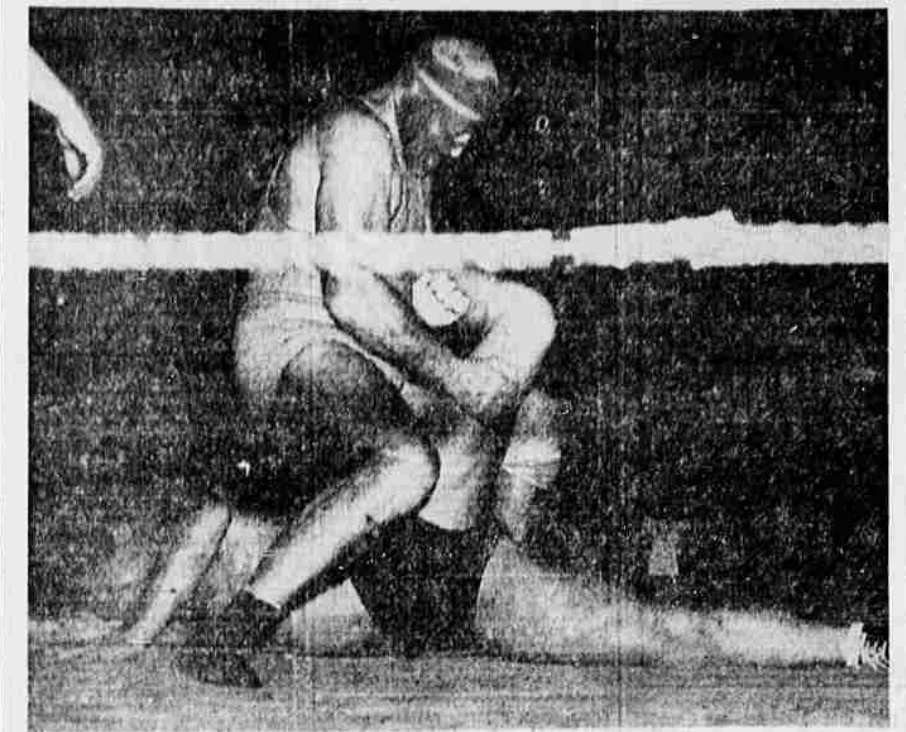

Ramblers Use Wide Variety Of Formations and Plays

The California Ramblers, who will play Klamath's Marines on Modoc field next Saturday afternoon, is a junior varsity squad made up of men cut from the Golden Bears varsity at the end of spring training or during the season.

During the week the Ramblers scrimmage against the California varsity, often using the system of play the varsity expects to meet in its next game. Because of this, the Ramblers possess a wide variety of systems and plays.

At the same time, this situation may prevent the team from spending as much time perfecting any one type play as much as Coach CPO Pat Lynaugh, USN, desires.

The formation Lynaugh expects to use mostly when the Ramblers meet the Marines are the double wing and T. Some plays may be run from the short punt formation.

Use of these formations makes for wide-open, fast football, and these systems have proved favorites of the average man in the grandstand, because they are more interesting to watch.

All but seven of the men who will probably make the trip to Klamath Falls with the Ramblers are V-12 students, and navy chief petty officers coach the squad. Seven of the squad members are civilians.

Oregon Prep Grid Elevens Step Up Pace

PORTLAND, Oct. 4 (P)—While many of Oregon's prep football elevens step up the tempo of their battle for top honors in their respective districts and berths in the late-November, four-club playoffs for the state championship this weekend, others will engage in inter-district and inter-state clashes.

Heaviest action counting toward sectional titles will take place in district 3 (northwestern Oregon). Salem's Vikings, unbeaten in the district but an inter-sector loser to the Klamath Falls Pelicans last week, will travel to Albany for a Friday night clash that opens the Bulldogs' season. It will also be a no-name league fracas.

Corvallis high's Spartans, beaten twice by Portland teams but a 20-0 victor over Springfield, will meet Milwaukie at Milwaukie Friday night. The Maroons have bowed to Salem in a district contest. In other district 3 games, West Linn plays at Oregon City Friday night and Hillsboro goes to Tigard. Lebanon to Springfield and Toledo to Taft for afternoon struggles.

Tolley Takes Charge Of Klamath Outlet

Hugh F. Tolley, engineer associated with the reclamation project at Shasta Dam, has been transferred to Klamath Falls. Tolley will be in charge of the Klamath straits drain outlet which will include the pumping plants to be constructed in the lower Klamath lake area and pertinent structures for disposal of excess waters in lower Klamath lake.

The main canal will be shut down October 10 and farmers desiring to irrigate should arrange for service prior to that date.

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Seals Take Governor's Cup Playoff

San Francisco Wins Series By Taking Final Tilt 4-2 On Freak Play in 5th Frame

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 4 (P)—For the sixth time in as many tries, Los Angeles has lost the Governor's cup playoff series among first division teams of the Pacific Coast league.

Lefty O'Doul's San Francisco Seals beat them at Wrigley field last night, 4 to 2, on what perhaps was the weirdest play for the entire year in all baseball.

Los Angeles recently won the pennant for the second year in a row and San Francisco now has taken the playoff twice running. The Seals picked up \$5000 in prize money for their accomplishment, the Angels \$2500 to go with the \$2500 they got for winning the pennant. Portland and Oakland, eliminated in the playoffs, got \$1250 each.

Last night's seventh game of the final series, played before 13,385 spectators, was decided in the fifth inning. Here's what happened: Heinie Steinbacher and Gus Suhr of San Francisco led off with singles. Ben Guinetti then bunted to advance the runners. Los Angeles Pitcher Pancho Comellas pounced on the ball, made a perfect throw to third base for what should have been an easy force out.

But—Stan Gray, in covering the base, tripped, fell, and the ball went bounding into the far reaches of left field. Steinbacher scored. Suhr scored. Even Guinetti, who bunted, crossed the plate. Yet his bunt didn't go half way to the pitcher's mound.

The Angels tried hard to save the game in the ninth. They loaded the bases with one out. Then Stan Gray strode to the plate. Here was a chance to redeem himself. He let a third strike go by. Manager Bill Sweeney charged onto the field, argued with Umpire Bill Doran, and was chased to the clubhouse. The veteran Johnny Moore batted for Catcher Billy Sarni and lifted a long, high fowl that Rightfielder Logan Hooper scored.

Shipyards Need 25,000 Workers

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (P)—Twenty-five thousand workers will be needed this month—9000 immediately—to meet urgent accelerating military and naval repair yards. War Manpower Commissioner Paul V. McNutt said yesterday.

Only Sports Writer To Pick Champs Says Browns Will Triumph

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 4 (P)—J. Edward Wray, 71-year-old sports editor of the St. Louis Post Dispatch, the only one of 68 baseball writers in the pre-season Associated Press poll to pick both the St. Louis Cardinals and Browns to win the National and American league pennants today picked the Browns to triumph in the world series.
