

SECOND FOR TALK ON POLITICS SET

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5 (AP)—President Roosevelt will make his second out-and-out political speech of the fourth-term campaign tonight, a radio address beamed to democratic party workers and aimed primarily at getting out a full strength vote in November.

There is considerable capital speculation whether the president will use the occasion to carry the campaign fight to his opponent, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, as he did in his opening address September 23.

Mr. Roosevelt will speak for about 20 minutes on a radio program arranged by the democratic national committee. The broadcast, starting at 7 p. m. (PWT) will be carried by the Columbia and Mutual networks.

Although the president gave no advance indication of his subject, most White House sources expect the address to confine itself largely to a go-to-the-polls appeal. However, Mr. Roosevelt has had no opportunity yet to make a public reply to the sharp attack Governor Dewey fired at his administration in the latter's recent campaign speech in Oklahoma City.

September Post Office Receipts Show Increase

The third quarter, including July, August, and September for 1943, showed a gross of \$38,163.67 compared to \$34,575.76 for the same period of this year. This establishes an increase of \$16,412.09 for the third quarter.

Attempting to find the trail Monday after spending the night huddled together in the rain, Mrs. Schnoeker fell over a 60-foot cliff into a creek. She was knocked unconscious but revived by the icy water.
