## ISOLATIONISM HIT IN SMITH SPEECH

Edgar W. Smith, democratic candidate for the office of United States senator, branded the isolationism of the United States which prevailed until Pearl Harbor as "one of the most dangerous elements to threaten a permanent and lasting peace," in his talk before the Klamath Falls Kiwanis club Thursday.

Smith drew a comparison between the grand alliance of European nations which finally crushed Napoleon, and the United Nations which are now bringing about the defeat of the axis. He observed that both Germany and Japan chose to "live by the sword and now they would die by the sword." The candidate prophesied that Woodrow Wilson's ideals and ambitions would be realized if the United Nations would stand side by side to safeguard the world from a third great catastrophe.

His warning against isolationism following this conflict was stern and Smith said that the same isolationist forces must be combated in writing the peace which will follow World War 2. Mr. and Mrs. Smith leave

Klamath Falls for Lakeview where a joint meeting of Rotary and Lions clubs has been arranged for him. From there they go to Bend to attend a scheduled dinner meeting. Smith will speak at both gatherings.

At the Thursday luncheon, shells, cigarettes and other articles were sold, proceeds of \$402 going to the community chest.
