## INCREASE IN FEED SUPPLY PREDICTED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (AP)—The agriculture department forecast today that the feed supply for animals on farms on the 1944-45 crop year is expected to be about 15 per cent above the 1943-44 crop year. Total supplies of feed grains for the 1944-45 feeding year are expected to reach 129,300,000 bushels, two per cent below this year's supply but the third largest on record.

The numbers of hogs and chickens on farms are being reduced considerably, the department said, and the number of sheep, horses and mules are declining moderately.

Feed grain prices probably will average somewhat lower, the department forecast.

The outlook, it added, is for near-record corn crops. The September 1 forecast was 3,100,000 bushels, slightly smaller than last year but the second largest crop on record.

## CORDON PROTESTS REFRIGERATOR BAN

PORTLAND, Oct. 5 (AP)—The Interstate Commerce Commission's ban on refrigerator cars for Oregon-California potato shipments was protested by Sen. J. Cordon (R-Ore.) today as a "ridiculous" measure.

In telegrams to the ICC and in the office of defense transportation, Cordon urged reconsideration of the rule as not based on sound judgment. Without refrigeration, he said, much of the Klamath basin's potato crop will be lost.

Potato shipments for the first five days of October totaled 205 carloads, and showed a dropping off after the refrigeration cars went on at midnight Monday.

Here are the day's shipments: far, October 1, Sunday, 25 cars; Monday, 93 cars; Tuesday, 4 cars; Wednesday, 44 cars.

## Wage Investigator Now in Klamath

Percy W. Varney, investigator for the wage stabilization program, has arrived here to send a part of the harvest season in connection with the farm wage ceiling program.

F. W. Squier, wage stabilization officer, who is here for the season, said that indications are that farm wages are generally in line with the ceilings established after a hearing.

## Weekly Market Trend

(Editor's Note: The following market information is supplied from material obtained over the government hand wire in the office of the extension economist at Oregon State college. The material in this form is a weekly summary of trends in the livestock market and is intended to replace spot day-by-day market reports.)

### CATTLE MARKETS

Good and choice beef cattle continued to advance and prices were slightly higher at North Portland Monday. October 2. Other kinds were steady or slightly lower on cows grading common or below. Midwest markets are reporting an increasing proportion of western cattle in current receipts. Approximate 4000 northwestern grass cattle arrived in Chicago for Monday, mostly cows and steaked yearlings. The receipts were fully steady at \$11.75 to \$12.75, with a few at \$13.

**SHEEP AND LAMB MARKETS**

Lamb, bulk fat lambs and feeders started the week steady to strong at North Portland, Omaha, and Chicago. The top, at about \$12, at North Portland was up 50 cents over the last of the previous week. Two loads of western lambs brought the top price of \$14.15 at Omaha. Three loads of choice black feeding lambs brought \$12.75 at Omaha.

Effective October 2 all lambs born in this state of 1944 are classified as **HOG MARKETS**

Hog markets opened the week beginning October 2 active and fully steady, although the support price was reduced to \$12.25 and the trade dragged. October 1 and now applies only to good and choice butcher hogs weighing 200 to 240 pounds. The quotation at North Portland on good to choice 180 to 240 pound hogs was \$15.75, about a dollar over Chicago.

## WHEAT

CHICAGO, Oct. 5 (AP)—Prices were down a cent or more in most grain futures markets today and the trade dragged. Bears were inactive despite the lag in buying interest and apparently were unwilling to press the selling side for fear of further bullish news of government price support.

Orders for wheat came from mills and commission houses and the May delivery was wanted at \$1.62.

An overnight accumulation of selling orders caused rice to break early and there was little trading power in the market.

The demand for oats was limited. At the close wheat was 2 1/2¢ lower than yesterday's finish, December \$1.60. Corn was down 1/4¢ to 1 1/4¢, December \$1.15 1/4. Oats were 1/4¢ to 1 1/4¢ lower, December \$1.07 1/4, barley was off 1/4¢ to 1 1/4¢, December \$1.05 1/4.

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## MONTH'S CEILING ON TURKEY FIXED

The OPA has announced that the ceiling price on turkeys for October to producers is 43 cents per pound boxed weight. When purchased loose weight, 1 1/2 cents per pound is deducted, making the actual dressed price loose weight, 41 1/2 cents per pound.

From this ceiling 2.8 cents per pound on a dressed chilled weight basis is deductible when the grower has his turkeys processed by a processor who subsequently purchases the birds. The October ceiling for sales by a grower to such a processor is 35.7 cents per pound Grade A, Grade B, 1 1/2 cents per pound less—total 37.2 cents per pound. Grade C, 4 cents per pound less—total 34.7 cents per pound. (Ceiling prices for November are 1 cent less than the prices quoted above.)

## BUILDING RUSHED ON SPUD WAREHOUSE

TULELAKE—Construction of a large two-story potato storage warehouse and packing plant being built at Hatfield by U. S. Alderman, Oregon City, who has extensive potato growing interests in this area, is being rushed in preparation for the digging season.

The building, with an approximate floor space of 100 by 300 feet, is centered with a wide driveway from where potatoes may be unloaded from both sides. The lower floor will be used for storage and the upper floor will be devoted to space for packing.

Alderman has about 500 acres of potatoes, grown principally in the Malin and Merrill districts.

## Margarine Shortage Predicted for '44

CHICAGO, Oct. 5 (AP)—Margarine manufacturers, reporting heavy demands for their product from consumers unable to buy butter, predict a shortage of the butter substitute.

The industry is operating on a government quota basis, making 167 per cent of its production in the basic years of 1940-41. Until about a year ago this quota was set at 180 per cent.
