

# Leathernecks on Edge For Tilt With Ramblers

### Aerial Attack Stressed in Work-Outs This Week; Wing Spots Strengthened

The pre-game condition of the Marine Barracks' gridiron squad has been brought to a much keener edge this week, insofar as team coordination and psychological attitude is concerned.

The team winds up its scrimmaging and skull drills today and will rest in preparation for the game against the University of California's Ramblers, here tomorrow afternoon at 2 p. m. Pass defense and offense has been stressed this week and newcomers to the squad groomed.

PFC Jack Walters, who has just broken into the lineup, is probably the best bet to take over right half. Walters, with PFC Franklin Gabriel, also a recent addition trying at full, should greatly bolster the weak Marine backfield.

If Walters is in good enough shape, Coach Roberts plans to start him against the Ramblers. Both he and Gabriel will definitely be around to snatch some game experience and will be better prepared for the tilt with the Coast Guard Receiving Station, San Francisco.

With Jack Walters available, Capt. Roy Walters is being shifted to tailback, giving the marines two light, fast men to run through any holes opened by the marine line.

LaPaglia's stellar play in last week's game won him the major nod to start at full. However, a new candidate for the line-smashing position, PFC Ed Faden has proven to be a high-stepping back and will add speed to the backfield whenever he is called.

In an effort to strengthen the wings, Major Roberts has put in a good bit of time with his ends. He says that he has fair material, but that they must become more familiar with the position in order to put up a better showing than in last Saturday's game. Cpl. Oscar Chapin, a veteran end, will probably be used as a starter with Darnell in an attempt to gain the advantage of his experience. There is a possibility that PFC Bob Dravin, who performed in grand style at end in the few minutes he played against the Willamette Navycats, may win a starting assignment.

For the passing game, the marines are still hoping to uncover a reliable receiver to make the team a definite threat in the air. Coach Roberts had his squad working over different pass plays this week, and expressed the opinion that, although the Leathernecks have a powerful line, and yardage for the marines in last week's contest was practically all gained through the line, a scoring punch with passes is badly needed.

All in all, it is generally believed that the marines will bounce back with a better, smoother eleven when they take the field tomorrow.

The Ramblers, on the gridiron, are as unpredictable as the weather and always put out a good game, as the men on the team

keep eyeing their possibilities of becoming members of the Golden Bears, California's number one team.

Tickets are now on sale for the game at the chamber of commerce offices.

### Relief Righthander Gives Shot in Arm to Collapsing Cards in 2nd Series Tilt

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 6 (AP)—Olivia, Minn. and a large part of St. Louis were happy today to report that Billy Southworth has at least one secret weapon to fire at those astounding Browns, who use almost any old blunderbuss to subdue their enemies.

Olivia gave the world (and Cardinal quarters of St. Louis) Sylvester "Blix" Donnelly, 29-year-old righthander who in turn gave the Browns nothing but a tremendous headache in the second game of the world series.

Blix trudged out to the mound in the eighth inning yesterday. The Cards' hopes of a world championship were fading. When he walked off the hill at the end of the 11th he had painted a Cardinal hue on the series horizon.

He began by making a personal errand of Messrs. Chet Laabs, Vern Stephens, the American League champion, and Mark Christman, striking out each in his turn. The winning run during this procedure danced on second base in the person of Mike Kreevich, who had doubled to lead off the inning and send Max Lanier to an early bath.

Donnelly, troubled by poor control, had lost to the Giants only last Sunday by walking in the winning run.

For the record, here are the cold facts of his performance in the first two games of the series: He has allowed only two hits and no runs in six innings (two in the opener and four yesterday). He whiffed seven batters in the four innings he worked yesterday.

A brilliant Minor league record, however, indicates Blix is no flash in the pan. He has three no-hitters to his credit and in 1941 sent his sweeping curve ball past 304 strikeouts victims while pitching for Springfield, Mo., in the western association.
