## TRUCK TRANSPORT OFFICES MOVED

## INSTALLATION OF COOLING UNIT UNDERWAY

TULELAKE—Installation of a large refrigeration unit in the Cal-Ore Packing company warehouse on the highway south of Tulelake, built last year by Dalton, Evans, West and Lyon is under way and will be completed within the next few days. The system is being installed by the Northwest Baker Ice Machine company with headquarters at Omaha, Nebraska with E. W. Shandy as foreman.

The cooler eliminates a sweat period for onions and potatoes, drawing out the field heat before the produce is damaged.

The warehouse has a capacity of 30,000 100-pound sacks of onions or potatoes. Potatoes will follow the onion crop into storage.

The Cal-Ore company is operating also this year one of the largest potato sorters ever used in the basin. The sorter is being used in the company's warehouse at Hatfield by Lloyd E. Lisk, who has the crew operation contract for the harvest season.

A large percentage of the potatoes being harvested will be consumed by the armed forces, 25 per cent of the run on Wednesday at the Cal-Ore plant being taken by the army. Lisk stated that some days the entire output goes to the government.

This is the first year that a grader of this size has been used here. One other machine of this type is being operated by Elzie Roberts for Levi and Zentner at Hatfield.

## Grange Asks Change In Liquor Rules

TULELAKE — The Tulelake grange, which has gone on record as favoring a change in the supervision of the state liquor control commission, will present a recently adopted resolution at the state convention asking that the California state grange request a transfer of the commission control from the jurisdiction of the board of equalization. The plan calls for the commission in the future to be directed by a chairman appointed by the governor of California. The state convention will be held in Sacramento, October 17-22.

The action was taken by the local grange in an effort to bring about a more satisfactory understanding between the liquor commission and this community in regulation and granting of licenses for the sale of liquor.

The state grange session will be attended by H. T. Street, master of the Tulelake grange, Mrs. Street and Rev. and Mrs. Hugh Bronson, Rev. Bronson, grange chaplain, was elected alternate. He and Mrs. Bronson will meet Rev. Bronson's parents there, his father being master of the grange at San Raphael.

C., where he is on detail at the WRA office in place of Dr. Carlyle Thompson, who recently joined the armed forces.

The full time daily classes will include the study of practical nursing, anatomy, physiology, materia medica, hygiene, sanitation, nursing ethics, bacteriology and dietetics.

Hospital authorities also revealed this week that Dr. Ikuta left recently for Rohwer center, Ark., from where he plans to continue to the University of Pennsylvania for post-graduate work.

## Homemaking Highlights

**From the Office of the Home Demonstration Agent**

**HONEY** is food news just now, too. It is not plentiful, and it is expensive, but, should you be short on sugar, it might be worthwhile to get a little honey to eke out the sugar ration. If you are sending food overseas as Christmas gifts to persons in the armed services, this recipe for honey caramels may interest you. Wrapped in waxed paper and packed in tin cans it will stand the rigors of travel very well.

One cup honey  
 Two cups of sugar  
 1 1/2 cups of cream  
 1 cup butter  
 Vanilla, nuts.

Boil the honey, sugar, cream and butter until the candy reaches a temperature of 254 degrees (sea level) and then add the vanilla and nuts. Pour into greased pans and allow to cool. Cut into squares.

**ONE MRS. WEST** (we don't know which one) called the home demonstration agent's office Friday morning to inquire how to wash white leather—kid in this case. We gave her the best solution to her problem that we knew at the moment, and now, having found a better way, we wish to submit this method: Mend rips in the glove or garment. Dissolve two tablespoons of finely shaved paraffin in one quart of cleaning solvent. Put the article to be cleaned in a container of suitable size... a glass jar or stone crock is ideal, and
